PRESIDENT'S LETTER



Rockets launched from Gaza into Israel do not make leading news stories "because there is the sense that it happens so much. It is not seen as new news," a national television news anchor acquaintance recently explained to me. Huh?!

Two hundred and thirty seven (237) rockets and mortars hit Israel in October 2012. This would certainly be a featured news story if the rockets were fired from Toronto into

Buffalo, or if they were shot from Brussels into Dusseldorf or Kurdistan into Turkey. So when Israel is attacked, it is less newsworthy because it happens with such frequency.

Of course we all now know that once Israel made the decision to respond militarily, then we have a front-page-above-the-fold news story. And incredibly enough, that news story, frequently in the United State and almost always in the rest of the world, portrays Israel as the aggressor. Huh?!

The double standard is obvious: the higher the expectations, the greater the media scrutiny. Conversely, from those whom little is expected, the media sets the bar low. According to this upside-down world view, it is barely newsworthy that the Israeli Defense Force drops leaflets and sends text messages to fore-warn Gaza's civilians of impending attacks on military targets.

Similarly we would not expect the mainstream media to lead with the story of Hamas's summary execution of "collaborators," their corpses dragged by their feet through the streets. Try to imagine if the actors were reversed. That would take a very strong imagination.

This phenomenon is complemented by the fact that the media judges those it perceives as weak by a different standard than those viewed as strong. While the *Torah* requires that the law judge the rich and poor by one standard (Lev 19:15), the media evidences a bias of sympathy toward the perceived underdog. Clearly, Gaza is poor and militarily weak compared to Israel, the larger reality is that the one Jewish State is surrounded by 20 plus unfriendly Muslim countries. The underdog is in the eyes of the beholder.

As I draft these words for our January bulletin, I am reading that Nobel Peace Prize winners, artists, and activists have called for a boycott of Israel for its actions in Gaza.

The world is upside down. And that is old news.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Rabbi Elliot J. Holin



When we dedicated our synagogue in September 2006, one of the first decisions that I needed to make was where I wanted my study to be. At first glance, close to the sanctuary made sense, but the thought of having it nestle amidst our nursery school students seemed to be intuitively correct. In addition to literally engaging the significance of dor l'dor-"from generation to generation"-it would also mean that the daylight hours would be enlivened by the sounds of children's voices and laughter. So I have been happily situated just a short walk down a long hall from the sanctuary, and just an open door from smiling faces and instant conversation outside my study or in their classrooms.

During one of their weekly Friday morning 'get ready for *Shabbat*' services, I asked the children to tell me about their favorite and happiest dreams. Most of them shared snippets of what they recalled—friendly animals, sunny days, and wonderful trips—but one little girl's rendition was so replete with story lines, details, and the pure joy of talking about it that I was startled and delighted by this unanticipated gift. The memory of those moments has stayed with me, so much so that whenever we read about dream sequences in the *Torah*, I am reminded of those moments with the children in our chapel and her recollection in particular.

In a *Torah* Portion that we recently read as *Hanukkah* was about to begin, Jacob's son, Joseph, had dreams that he told to his brothers and then to his father. Just as his father's life and identity were shaped by dreams, so too would dreams and his ability to interpret them transform Joseph's life and that of our People.

As our journey through 5773 continues, and 2013 commences, it seems appropriate to ask if there are dreams that you recall with great clarity and, if so, why they are important to you. Have you had dreams, or have you read about dreams in Biblical narratives or other sources, that have had a profound impact upon you? If so, please consider sharing them with me in conversation or through written reflections.

Dreams offer us tantalizing hints about our past, and possible insights about the future, subject to interpretation and then inspiration. The key to turning the lock that might reveal the meaning of messages within dreams is found in the word spoken by Joseph when his father told him to commence a journey to find his brothers: "Hineni, Here I am, ready to begin!"

The willingness to take the first step is what makes everything possible. It is what can turn our dreams into reality, and that seems to be a great resolution for the new year: allow for possibilities.

"Rabbi Hillel says that the fifteenth of *Shevat* shall be the new year for the tree" — Mishnah, Rosh Hashanah 1:1



Tu B'Shvat, the fifteenth day of the Hebrew month of *Shevat*, is the Jewish holiday that marks the "New Year of the Trees."

Tu B'Shvat has become the Jewish Earth Day and a time to reflect on our earth, our food sources, the environmental issues, and our connection with our surroundings. Customs include planting trees; eating from the seven species of fruits, vegetables, and grains indigenous to Israeli soil (pomegranates, barley, wheat, olives, figs, grapes, and dates); and performing a ritualized *seder* complete with

four cups of wine and symbolic fruits and nuts.

Honoring Tu B'Shvat by creating a seder is a modern way to renew ancient traditions and bring more joy to your life! Come join our Fifth Annual Tu B'Shvat Seder on **Sunday, January 27, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.**, sponsored by the Hazon Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. Examine how food connects us to Jewish tradition, to the earth, to other people, and to ourselves. Learn, be inspired, sing, eat a delicious soup-and-salad dinner and some fruits and nuts, and drink four cups of wine as we celebrate the holiday of the trees.







Another Great Book to be Discussed at Lou Barrett's Book Group

Tragic, comic, and utterly honest, this extraordinary memoir is at once a great family saga and a magical self-portrait of a writer

one knows each other, a place that is a sanctuary in the literal sense."





The Jewish Relief Agency is a dynamic, volunteerdriven organization whose goal is to help Jews in need. Since its founding in 2000, JRA has been bringing together individuals of all means, ages, and backgrounds each month in a spirit of community and *tikun olam*. Through the efforts of JRA's community of more than 10,000 volunteers, monthly food relief packages are provided to 2,750 low-income families in the Greater Philadelphia area.

JRA food distributions take place one Sunday each month throughout the year at their warehouse in Northeast Philadelphia. Volunteers work together to package kosher, non-perishable food in boxes. After packing, volunteers load their cars and deliver the food packages to each of the recipient families according to pre-determined delivery routes, complete with driving directions and maps. Most delivery routes take between 30 to 60 minutes to complete.
