#### Abstract

Professor Howard Bogot is a graduate of Lewis University (formerly National College of Education) in Evanston, Illinois; the University of Cincinnati; and the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, Ohio. In addition to receiving his MEd from the University of Cincinnati and graduate degrees from HUC-JIR, Rabbi Bogot has completed post-graduate coursework in Education and Social Work at Bryn Mawr College in Pennsylvania and Hunter College in New York City.

Prior to accepting the positions of Director for the Department of Religious Education as well as Curriculum Development and Special Projects (1981-1996) for the Union of Reform Judaism (formerly the Union of American Hebrew Congregations), Professor Bogot provided administrative, consultative, and academic leadership (1968-1981) for Gratz College, the oldest Hebrew Teachers College in the Western Hemisphere.

From 1992-1996, Howard Bogot served as a faculty member of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, Marymount Manhattan College, and Fordham University as Clinical Professor of Education and Assistant Professor in the departments of Humanities and Theology.

From 1996-2001, while on a consultancy in Israel, Rabbi Bogot served as a Visiting Professor on the faculty of the New Immigrant English Teacher Education program at Israel's Beit Berl College. He provided students with seminars in Jewish Identity Values, English Proficiency, and Pedagogy. He is also cofounder, educational consultant, and faculty for the Institute on Creative Jewish Thought in Netanya, Israel, and a member of the Advisory Board for the Peace Education Commission of the World Conference on Religion and Peace.

After watching the move "Food Stamped," which was shown at our synagogue last month, Rabbi Holin suggested an article for the bulletin to give our members useful, interesting, and sometimes surprising information on the topic of nutrition.

The Environmental Working Group (EWG) is a nonprofit organization that uses the power of public information to protect public health and the environment. Their staff researches government data, legal documents, scientific studies, and their own laboratory tests to expose threats to your health and the environment and to find solutions.

Each year, the EWG publishes a list called "The Dirty Dozen," which are the twelve fruits and vegetables most contaminated with pesticides. In our first Kol Ami NU?-trition article, we bring you a summary of EWG's list of the DIRTY DOZEN, as well as the CLEAN FIFTEEN, the least contaminated fruits and veggies (see lists at right).

Keep in mind, the health benefits of a diet rich in fruits and vegetables outweigh the risks of pesticide exposure. Use EWG's Shopper's Guide to Pesticides to reduce your exposures as much as possible, but eating conven-tionally-grown produce is far better than not eating fruits and vegetables at all.

The Shopper's Guide to Pesticide in Produce will help you determine which fruits and vegetables have the most pesticide residues and are the most important to buy organic. You can lower your pesticide intake substantially by avoiding the most contaminated fruits and vegetables and eating the least contaminated produce.
