# FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

# PREPARING FOR THE HIGH HOLY DAYS AT OUR *SELICHOT* SERVICE ON SATURDAY, AUGUST 31, AT 9:00 P.M.



n Saturday evening, August 31, at 9:00 p.m., we will introduce a draft copy of the new version of our late-night *Selichot* service just five days prior to *Rosh Hashanah*.

One can either "arrive" at the High Holy Days or one can "prepare" for them. The *Selichot* service is our annual "call to conscience" as we take measure of who we are, what we value, and the distance between what we say and what we do. In our tradition, the process of repentance leading to confession commences a full month before the New Year, and the *Selichot* service is toward the end of that journey that leads to new beginnings: the ten days on the Jewish calendar that we call "high" and "holy."

In Hebrew, the word *selichah* means "forgiveness" and this service, through new and evocative words, asks us to focus on what we have done wrong and what we need to do better. The *Selichot* service—the plural of *selichah*—is a litany of readings that encourage us to explore what we have done wrong as well as what we have refrained from doing when response was necessary. This service contains the "touchstone" to our true and better selves.

Our Worship Enhancement Committee joins me in urging you to read the following words from the new draft copy of the *Selichot* service as a way to prepare for the High Holy Days.

# THE ESSENCE OF ATONEMENT

"Moses Ibn Ezra [1060-1138, a Spanish philosopher, linguist and poet, whose writings are found in the traditional liturgy of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur], gives us a striking image for the Ten Days of Repentance, which culminate in Yom Kippur. Our Sins are like a veil covering the face, concealing the true person from God — perhaps obscuring us as well from the people in our lives and from ourselves. The process of t'shuvah (repentance) is meant to return us to our core, the person we are — the good and worthy human being masked behind the veil. T'shuvah represents an optimistic outlook on life: . . . For this is the moment when we are no longer hidden from our Maker. This is the precious moment of renewing the relationship."

# **FAILURES OF JUSTICE**

"We dishonor You when we dishonor our society.

For our failure of justice, Adonai, we seek forgiveness.

For being indifferent to deprivation and hunger, while accepting a culture of self-indulgence and greed.

For abuse of power in board rooms, court rooms and classrooms, and for accepting the neglect of children and elders, the ill and the weak.

For permitting social inequalities to prevail, and for lacking the vision to transcend our selfishness.

For glorifying violence and turning hastily to war, and for allowing history to repeat itself.

For behaviors that risk the future of our planet, and for wreaking havoc on our only true inheritance – God's creation."

May these summer months be a time of reflection that will lead to meaningful worship for all of us during the High Holy Days.

Congregation Kol Ami is excited to offer *Torah* chanting (*trope*) classes for adults. Those who enroll in the program will learn how to read and identify trope signs and how to apply them. Born in Jerusalem in 1937, Steinsaltz studied mathematics, physics, and chemistry at Hebrew University in

addition to rabbinic studies. An Orthodox rabbi, renowned as a teacher, philosopher, and spiritual guide, he devoted his life to making the *Talmud* accessible to all Jews. This book is a collection of his "pebbles of wisdom" from more than 30 years of his lectures and writings about life, awareness, and faith.

The course-discussion about Steinsaltz's writings will continue at the request of our recently concluded April class participants, though you need not have been with us before to join us now. We are reflecting upon his thoughts that resonate in us, and talking about how they are manifest in our lives. We will explore topic headings: 'The Nature of *Torah*,' 'The *Mitzvot*: Understanding God's Commandments, '*Kabbalah*,' 'Struggles, Battles and Trials,' 'Suffering,' and 'Evil.'

# Ancestors and Ghosts, Spirit Guides, and Reincarnating Souls: Ancient Mystery and Contemporary Meaning of Afterlife in Jewish Traditions

Instructor: Rabbi Simcha Raphael Monday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. November 25; December 2, 9 & 16 (4 Sessions)

This is an exploration of Jewish afterlife texts spanning three millennia of history. As travelers through time, we will enter the worlds of *Torah*, *Talmud*, *Midrash*, *Zohar*, and *Hasidic* tales investigating diverse ways Jews have understood the enigmatic mystery of death and the world beyond.

Searching for spiritual renewal of traditional teachings, we will use these texts for reflection and discussion, discovering practical guidelines for responding to the human encounter with death — personally, and in our families and communities.

# Superheroes and Judaism

Instructor: Mr. David Monblatt Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. February 6, 13, 20 & 27 (4 Sessions)

This fun and engaging course will explore the fantastical world of superheroes and what their stories have in common with Judaism. Over the years, the superhero genre has dealt with a vast array of topics, such as the nature of evil, atonement, remembrance, and the importance of social justice. Superheroes and Judaism will examine both the DC and Marvel pantheons, focusing on some of the best-known heroes, including Batman, Wolverine, Iron Man, and, of course, The Man of Steel.

# Hayyim Nahman Bialik (1873-1934): Israel's National Poet - His Words and Influence

Instructor: Rabbi Elliot Holin Tuesday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. March 4, 11, 18 & 25 (4 Sessions)



Bialik was born in Ukraine and studied at the renowned Volozhin Yeshivah in Lithuania. His poem "Should You Wish To Know The Source" is fulsome praise for the synagogue as a house of prayer, study, and the embodiment of *mitzvot*. "Sabbath Queen" is a beautiful description of the gifts that the day of rest bestows on

everyone who tastes its splendor. He eventually left the *yeshivah* to join the *Haskalah* (Jewish Enlightenment) movement.

In 1903, his epic poem "In the City of Slaughter" was a scream of anguish following the brutality of the Kishinev pogroms, precursor to the flames of the Holocaust that would be kindled thirty years later.

His poems urged a reawakening of the Jewish People in the face of anti-Semitism and in the name of national identity (Zionism) as well as poems that speak about intimate relationships found in love and friendship.

We will read and discuss each of the poems noted above, as well as the following poems: "Her Eyes" (1892), "When I Return" (1896), "In the City of Slaughter" (1903), "The Scroll of Fire" (1905), "I Knew in a Night of Fog" (1905), "Call for the Snakes" (1906), "Before the Book Closet" (1910), "Your Breath Passed upon My Face" (1916), and others.



# Moses: From Existence as Slavery to Existence as Freedom - Mensch, Myth, Midrash

Instructor: Rabbi Howard Bogot Wednesday mornings from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. March 5, 12, 19 & 26 (4 Sessions)

Moses is often embraced as a reflection of Jewish character; unique, goal-oriented, God-choosing, but always human. Was Moses real or the invention of the collective conscience of the Hebrew people? Is Moses a law-giver, teacher, or "union organizer"? Participants in this seminar will explore the Mosaic persona as well as the inability of this heroic leader to enter the Promised Land or be mentioned in a traditional *Pesach Haggadah*.

# Leviticus 19

Instructor: Rabbi Howard Bogot Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. April 3, 10, 17 & 24 (4 Sessions)

This discussion group will examine the one chapter in the *Torah* that could easily serve as the most user-friendly and concise definition of Judaism. Known as the "Holiness Code," this summary of Jewish ethics and moral imperatives includes verses such as: "Neither curse the deaf nor place a stumbling block before the blind." Participants will apply the concept of uniqueness to various selections.

#### THE INSTRUCTORS

RABBI PROF. HOWARD BOGOT is a graduate of Lewis University (formerly National College of Education) in Evanston, Illinois; the University of Cincinnati; and the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, Ohio. In addition to receiving his M.Ed from the University of Cincinnati and graduate degrees from HUC-JIR, Rabbi Bogot has completed post-graduate course work in education and social work at Bryn Mawr College in Pennsylvania and Hunter College in New York City. He has authored and coauthored many books, syllabi, and lesson plans, published by both the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Since 2001, Rabbi Bogot has served the Auerbach Central Agency for Jewish Education and the University of Pennsylvania's Literacy Network as a Jewish studies facilitator for their Nurturing Excellence in Supplementary Jewish Schools project. In 2005, the University of Pennsylvania asked Rabbi Bogot to mentor 30 teachers at Cheltenham High School.

**RABBI ELLIOT J. HOLIN**, in addition to teaching in our Continuing Jewish Education program, also meets with members for personal *Torah* study as well as preparation for individual adult *Bar* or *Bat Mitzvah*.

**DAVID MONBLATT** is our congregation's Director of Education. He has been in the field for over 19 years, specializing in school transformation for the last nine. Previously, he served as Director of Congregational Learning for Temple Sinai in Dresher as well as the Congregational School Specialist for the Bureau of Jewish Education of San Francisco. He also served as Director of Education for the Jewish Partisan Educational Foundation, a national nonprofit that produces films and a curriculum about the stories and life lessons of the Jewish partisans of World War II.

**SIMCHA RAPHAEL, Ph.D.**, is Adjunct Associate Professor in Jewish Studies at Temple University, and teaches courses on Jewish mysticism. He works as a psychotherapist and spiritual director affiliated with the Mount Airy Counseling Center in Philadelphia. He has had a longtime interest in the synthesis of contemporary psychology and Jewish mysticism in creating a spiritual path for life today. Ordained by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi as a Rabbinic Pastor, he is author of the book "Jewish Views of the Afterlife." His website is www.simcharaphael.com.

**REBECCA SCHWARTZ** is our congregation's Cantorial Soloist and specializes in worship experiences, engaging people in the power of prayer through music. She has produced two congregational CDs along with her adult and student choirs.



# SH'LAH'CHAY'NEE "SEND ME!"

Sh'lah'chay'nee - "Send me!" (Isaiah 6:8)

The ancient Hebrew prophets—Amos, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Micah among them—were zealous in their demands that people respond to the needs of the homeless, hungry, and infirm. Their paradigm for those who had precious few to speak on their behalf included the orphan, the poor, the stranger, and the widow.

Isaiah, writing in the names of all prophets who preceded him, as for those who would follow him, said: "I heard the voice of the Lord, asking, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go [forth in God's Name]?' I said, 'Here I am. Sh'lah'chay'nee – Send me!'"

Isaiah's words are an echo of the text in the Book of Deuteronomy that tells us it is imperative to "uphold the cause of the orphan and widow, befriend the stranger, and provide food and clothing [to the poor]" (Deut. 10:18).


Two years ago on Rosh Hashanah, I encouraged us to create a Sh'lah'chay'nee banner to be placed in the hallway of our religious school. On large, brightly colored index cards, Kol Ami children, youth, and adults were asked to write about recent mitzvot that they performed, and those cards would be placed at the edges of the banner. My hope was that every few weeks, new index cards will replace current ones, keeping us abreast of wonderful things that our members are doing within and beyond our synagogue in the spirit of mitzvot.

Last year, our seventh-grade students and their parents created the amazing banner which is displayed in our hall-way of the religious school. The personally written index cards describe what individuals have done in the past few months in the name of *tikun olam* (healing, lit. "fixing" the world of pain). Every three months, students in our religious school were given an index card to fill out describing a *mitzvah* they did that had personal meaning to them. Cards were rotated during the following weeks so that everyone's words appeared on the banner.

Adults are encouraged to pick up the large, colorful index cards at worship services and in the religious school office to be filled in. Please return these cards to Jessica in the religious school office when completed. This will assure that new cards will be rotated out-and-in, vetted, on a regular schedule.

Together, we can continue to make a statement. We can inspire each other. We can touch other lives.















