

Who has not, if even for a nanosecond, seen your own child at six or seven years old alone in the schoolroom, terrified and calling for you? Who has not, if only for a nanosecond, pictured your child ripped from your arms by a cold jackbooted Nazi, or an indifferent drunk driver, or impersonal illness? Who has not questioned the idea of God, the existence of God? Who has not dismissed God with disdain and contempt in the senseless death of a child, especially if it were your child? Who has not yearned for a just world, for order and reason in the universe? Who has not struggled with God?

The ancient story of Elisha ben Abuyah and his crisis of faith is even more timely today than when it was first recorded 2000 years ago. This story provided the basis for the novel "As a Driven Leaf" by Rabbi Milton Steinberg, an unorthodox thinker who had come under the influence of Mordechai Kaplan, the founder of Reconstructionist Judaism, while a student at the Jewish Theological Seminary in the 1920s.

In his foreward to "As a Driven Leaf," Chaim Potok tells us that little is known about the historical Elisha ben Abuyah, the central character of the novel: "There is considerable debate about his role in Jewish history and his relationship to the sages; he is accused of being an apostate, a dualist, a Sadducee, a lover of harlots, a betrayer of the Jews to the Romans after the debacle of the Bar Kochba rebellion in 132-135 C.... His lasting fame—or infamy!—rests on his having been one of a minute number of rabbis excommunicated during the entire eight hundred years of the Rabbinic period."

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

After this winter, spring can't come soon enough. The rebirth it portends has me thinking of future plans, and, this spring, I ask you to join me in thinking of and acting on your love of Israel. Israel embodies our past, occupies our present, and must be a part of our future as Reform Jews. There is so much we can each do to keep the dream of Israel alive, such as:



- 1. **Study about Israel**. As a student, you can collect for the Jewish National Fund and plant trees in Israel and/or participate in the Israeli Independence Day parade. If you are of *Bar* or *Bat Mitzvah* age, you likely received a gift of an Israeli bond, giving you the chance to reflect on what Israel might mean to you in the future when that bond matures.
- 2. **Peer trip to Israel**. In your late teens, you can take a four- or five-week NFTY trip to Israel. Thanks to the continued generosity of Sally and Stewart Eisenberg, our Discover Israel fund can afford you with as much as \$1,000 towards a peer trip. In the past, you had to make a choice between a NFTY trip and a Birthright trip, but now taking a peer trip no longer makes you ineligible for Birthright*. As URJ members, Kol Ami may be able to help if your child is wait-listed, especially for one of the URJ trips. (gokesher.org)
- 3. **Study in Israel**. Before, during, or after college, you might consider Masa Israel Journey, which connects Jewish young adults ages 18-30 to gap year, study abroad, post-college, and volunteer programs. Our own Jonathan Holin recently reveled in this experience, and David Holin is on a Masa trip now. (masaIsrael.org)
- 4. Family Trip to Israel. Nothing is more exciting than planning and taking your first family trip to Israel. Many of our families have done this, whether with the congregation or on their own. Just ask the Appels or the Asams or the Bakers or the Fishbeins or any of the many Kol Ami families who have been to Israel to regale you with their stories and tips from their recent trips.
- 5. Adult Trip to Israel. Visiting Israel as a mature adult may be a much different trip than on earlier visits. Our October 19-30, 2014, Kol Ami's Adult "Discover the Voices of Israel" trip will take us well off the beaten track. Commitment is due by April 1. Ellen and I are joining the Rabbi and Susan, and we hope you will too. Bart and Nadine Weiner had a different Israel experience by participating with Volunteers for Israel, working at an army base to free up IDF soldiers for more important duties. As Bart described it: "The trip gave us exposure to a slice of Israeli life that almost every Israeli citizen has experienced, but few tourists will ever see. It provided a different connection to the country that will last your lifetime, and a connection to the people and the land that is hard to get as a tourist. It was a patriotic experience different from the spiritual or historical connection you typically make when in Israel." (www.vfi-usa.org)

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Rabbi Elliot J. Holin

Anti-depressants, anyone? I have something better: create blessings.

It is one thing to go through life waiting for blessings, if by blessings we mean an affluence of goodness, but it is something else to create those moments for yourself and also for others. I do not mean material richness, but rather things that cannot be weighed or measured and are felt to be the essence of grace: health, happiness, contentment, hope. Add to those the willingness to be open to change, to allow for possibilities. Mix in families and friends to this nourishing, nurturing brew.

Sometimes blessings return to their source: to you. If you create blessings, I am convinced that you will see the world differently, you will experience life differently, and you will be more aware that blessings surround you because you have become proactive in creating them.

I have long believed this, and its message was reinforced in a fascinating article, "The Saintly Way to Succeed' by Susan Dominus ("The New York Times Magazine," March 27, 2013). She writes about Professor Adam Grant, PhD, 32 years of age, the youngest-tenured and highest-rated professor at Wharton. His field is organizational psychology, the study of workplace dynamics. He advises companies about how to maximize efficiency and productivity, but what he does consistently and remarkably well is that he creates an astonishingly positive effect upon people by virtue of constantly being there for them: in person, on the phone, and via e-mail. His thesis is that contributing to other peoples' lives has the potential for making us more productive than thinking about benefitting



ourselves. He phrased it this way: "I never get much done when I frame the 300 e-mails as 'answering e-mails.' I have to look at it as, How is this task going to benefit the recipient?"

The article goes on to inform the reader that in Grant's book, "Give and Take," he divides the world into three categories: "Givers, matchers, and takers. Givers give without expectation of immediate gain; they never seem too busy to help; share credit actively and mentor generously. Matchers go through life with a master chit list in mind, giving when they can see how they will get something of equal value back and to people who they think can help them. And takers seek to come out ahead in every exchange; they manage up and are defensive about their turf... Much of Grant's book sets out to establish the difference between the givers who are exploited and those who end up as models of achievement. The most successful givers, Grant explains, are those who rate high in concern for others, but also in self-interest. And they are strategic in their giving—they give to other givers and matchers, so that their work has the maximum desired effect; they are cautious about giving to takers; they give in ways that reinforce their social ties; and they consolidate their giving into chunks, so that the impact is intense enough to be gratifying...He found that people who felt they had contributed to others' well-being at work did not always feel great at the end of the workday; but they usually did by bedtime, especially if they had reflected about their contribution in the intervening hours."

Do good, feel good. Do more, feel better. Do more. Be a giver.





Continuing Jewish Education

Hayyim Nahman Bialik, Israel's National Poet: His Words and Influence

Tuesday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. March 4, 11, 18 & 25 (4 Sessions) Instructor: Rabbi Elliot J. Holin

Bialik (1873-1934) was born in Ukraine and studied at the renowned Volozhin Yeshivah in Lithuania. His poem "Should You Wish to Know the Source" is fulsome praise for the synagogue as a house of prayer, study, and the embodiment of *mitzvot*. "Sabbath Queen" is a beautiful description of the gifts that the day of rest bestows on everyone who tastes its splendor. Bialik eventually left the *yeshivah* to join the *Haskalah* (Jewish Enlightenment) movement.

In 1903, his epic poem "In the City of Slaughter" was a scream of anguish following the brutality of the Kishinev pogroms, precursor to the flames of the Holocaust that would be kindled 30 years later.

His poems urged a reawakening of the Jewish People in the face of anti-Semitism and in the name of national identity (Zionism) as well as poems that speak about intimate relationships found in love and friendship. We will read and discuss each of the poems noted above and many others.

Moses is often embraced as a reflection of Jewish character; unique, goal-oriented, God-choosing, but always human. Was Moses real or the invention of the collective conscience of the Hebrew people? Is Moses a law-giver, teacher, or "union organizer?" Participants in these seminars will explore the Mosaic persona as well as the inability of this heroic leader to enter the Promised Land or be mentioned in a traditional *Pesach Haggadah*.

Through discussion, seminar participants will consider the components that are hallmarks of the narrated moment in which the Jewish people received *Torah*.

RHONDA FINK-WHITMAN, AUTHOR OF "94 MAIDENS," TO SPEAK AT KOL AMI

Sunday, March 9 from 10:30 a.m. to Noon

It was August 11, 1942, and 94 schoolgirls ages 14 to 22 in Nazi-occupied Poland awaited their fate at the hands of their captors. Meanwhile, a young

Jewish family was on the run from the Nazis in Berlin, and time was running out for the pursuers and their prey.

Rhonda Fink-Whitman is a veteran TV and radio personality as well as an award-winning screenwriter, longtime Jewish educator, and the daughter of a Holocaust survivor. Her mother suffers the scars left by the Holocaust some 70 years later, and so Fink-Whitman went to Germany to probe Nazi archives in an attempt to discover what happened to her mother during World War II.

Inspired by true events, "94 Maidens" is a powerful story about heroism, resistance, martyrdom, and survival.

Fink-Whitman is also the director, producer, and host of "The Mandate Video," which she hopes will convince lawmakers in her home state, Pennsylvania, to mandate Holocaust and Genocide education in both the Commonwealth and in other states.

On October 2, 1978, in his first *Rosh Hashanah* sermon as the spiritual leader of Congregation Adath Jeshurun, Rabbi Rosenbloom gave voice to his calling: "To be a rabbi is to have faith

in the destiny of *ahm Yisrael*, the Jewish people; to be a rabbi in a congregation is to have faith in Jews, and to believe that in each of us there is what is called in Yiddish *das pintele Yid*, that little spark of Jewish soul that with proper guidance can blaze forth with the brilliance and luster of full Jewish living."

In 1997, after spending a year on a partial sabbatical, he wrote these words: "I am touched at these times when I see how my involvement, and the ancient faith we share, can touch the soul and elevate the spirit."

Rabbi Rosenbloom inspires us—within and beyond his synagogue—through word and deed. On *erev Shabbat*, June 9, 2006, three months before we would take our "*Torah* walk" carrying our sacred scrolls from Gratz College to dedicate our synagogue here on High School Road, Rabbi Rosenbloom and his congregation formally welcomed us to the community at a special service in AJ's sanctuary: a night of such joy that our arrival was sweetened by the embrace of this very special rabbi and his members.

Our rabbi considers Rabbi Rosenbloom a treasured colleague with whom he meets several times a year to discuss the challenges of the rabbinate and to share program ideas that will benefit the children, youth, and adults of the congregations we serve.

Our congregation and community been enriched by this remarkable man, and we will gather this evening to show him how much he means to us. 2014 PENN LECTURES IN JUDAIC STUDIES - MOVING INTO MODERNITY

HEBREW WITHOUT HEBREWS: CONVERSO HEBRAIST ALFONSO DEZAMORA AND THE SPANISH INQUISITION

Monday, April 7, at 7:00 p.m. at Kol Ami

Around 1530, at the peak of the Spanish imperial dominance of a large part of western Europe and the Americas, a Hebrew professor in the then leading humanist university of Alcalá de Henares wondered deep down in his heart about what to do. Born as a Jew in Spain and converted (as a "Converso") around the fateful year of 1492, when Jews were banned from legally living in the Iberian kingdoms, he had been summoned in 1530 by the powerful ideological police, the infamous Spanish Inquisition, to act as an expert witness in the ongoing trial of a "Judaizer"—a legally Christian person who was accused of practising Judaism clandestinely. He turned up before the Inquisition as a witness. But in his more intimate life, this Hebrew professor, known by his Christian name of Alfonso de Zamora, managed to write down a shot guideline for Conversos being brought before the ecclesiastical tribunal. He cautiously wrote it in the reserved language of the Hebrews among his private personal notes. In the course of his career of more than 40 years, Alfonso de Zamora, the paramount Hebrew Christian in early modern Spain, faced the Inquisition and individual inquisitors more than once. In my talk, we will explore together how relevant his experience is for our own modern struggles: how Alfonso faced discrimination, issues of identity, self-definition, and belongingness. In the process, I hope we will all be inspired by the complex personality of early modern Converso Hebraist Alfonso de Zamora.

YOM HASHOAH - HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE

Sunday, April 27, at 7:00 p.m., at Kol Ami "Teenagers Who Resisted the Nazis and Their Collaborators" presented by Mitch Braff, founder and executive director of the Jewish Partisan Foundation in San Francisco

This engaging presentation about historic facts and stories about Jewish partisans is a "must-see-and-hear" for our Congregation's young adults and adults. Many of the 30,000 Jewish partisans were teenagers who fought the Germans and their collaborators in at least 10 European countries. KOL AMI'S ARTIST OF THE MONTH: KIRSTEN FISCHLER, FROM FEBRUARY 25 TO APRIL 7

Kirsten Fischler's art expresses her struggle with life's duality—life is filled with contradiction, irony, contrast, and counterpoints, which often exist simultaneously. It also represents the cycle of life. She often reuses plywood that she finds discarded, or she recycles her own artwork within each piece. Many of the panels are completed paintings from former series or sample boards. In the past, she has painted over the images she didn't like, learning that life is not that clean. She grew from her mistakes and incorporated her past experience in a way that works both compositionally and spiritually.

Kirsten, a native of West Chester, PA, has developed a unique style of art making that incorporates recycled building materials in such a way that the leftover mundane is transformed into sought-after refinement. She has been working with reclaimed wood and oil paint as her primary



medium for over 20 years. Her early influences were John Lafarge and Louis Comfort Tiffany, who created the painted-glass windows in the Church of the Holy Trinity where her father was rector. She later was influenced by the work of Francis Bacon, Louise Nevelson, Chinese land-scape painters Yuanji and Kwo Zsi, as well as the medical drawings of Golgi and Cajal.

Kirsten received a BFA from Rhode Island School of Design in illustration, where she spent her junior year abroad in Rome, Italy, as part of the European Honors Program. She earned an MFA from Pratt Institute in painting. It was there that she was chosen to participate in the professional "Critic's Symposium." She ran her own faux-finishing and mural-painting business for several years after graduating, which led to the style of the paintings being shown here at the Synagogue.

Kirsten's work and a short biography appear in the book, "100 Artists of the Brandywine Valley" by Catherine Quillman. Kirsten has taught at Moore College of Art, Pratt Institute, and currently teaches part time at Delaware Colleges of Art and Design. Her work is in private collections both domestically and abroad.



'Birthright Israel' experience: The window opens wider

Several children of Kol Ami members have experienced Birthright—a 10-day, fully paid, Israel experience in the company of professionally trained guides—and they have returned transformed by what they saw, heard, and did.

Birthright Israel has redefined eligibility for their trips to be more inclusive, and we think it important that you and your children be aware of this opportunity that our rabbi highly recommends as a transforming experience in their lives.

ELIGIBILITY

Eligibility for the Birthright Israel gift is primarily based on these three factors:

- Ages 18 to 26
- Jewish background
- First time in Israel on a peer program since turning 18

Eligibility is determined through an online application and subsequent interview. Scroll down for more.

Israel Outdoors—which involves hiking, swimming, cave crawls, etc.—proudly welcomes approximately 8,000 young adults on a Birthright Israel experience each year. We are very proud to embrace a wide spectrum of backgrounds and interests—which is what makes our trip dynamics so special. Explore some of the profiles of our participants at www.israeloutdoors.com/exploring/i-amisrael-outdoors/.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

1) Ages 18 to 26

Applicants must be at least 18 years old at the time of the trip and must have already graduated from high school. Applicants can also be no older than 26 years old to still qualify for the program. However, anyone who is still 26 as of May 1 is eligible for any trip in the same summer season of trips even if they have turned 27 by the time of the actual trip (i.e., May, June, July or August.) Similarly, for winter trips, anyone who is still 26 as of December 1 is still eligible for any trip in the same winter season of trips even if they have turned 27 by the time of the actual trip (i.e., November, December, January, February, March).





NOTE: It is the policy of Israel Outdoors to give automatic priority status to applicants who are 26 since their eligibility window is closing soon!

2) Jewish Background

Applicants must have at least one Jewish birthparent or have converted to Judaism in order to qualify for the gift. But don't worry, having a Jewish background does not mean you need to be religious to qualify or fit in on our trips. In fact, many of the participants in Israel Outdoors have more of a cultural connection to Judaism than a traditional one. With Israel Outdoors, there is no "right way" to be Jewish, and you certainly don't need to worry about being "Jewish enough."

3) Prior Israel Experience

Rules pertaining to prior Israel experience have recently changed. Although the detailed rules have not yet been issued by Birthright Israel, we can tell you:



- Applicants who traveled to Israel prior to turning 18 on a peer program shorter than three months in length are eligible.
- Applicants who traveled to Israel prior to turning 18 on a peer program longer than three months in length may be eligible. Clarification will be posted soon.
- Applicants who traveled to Israel after turning 18 on a
 peer program designed for college students or young
 adults are not eligible. Such programs include any study
 abroad, gap year, yeshiva/seminary, and any other experience under the umbrella of Masa Israel.
- Applicants who traveled to Israel after turning 18 on a peer program designed for high school teens may be eligible. Clarification will be posted soon.
- Applicants who traveled to Israel on a peer program and turned 18 during the trip may be eligible. Clarification will be posted soon.
- Applicants who traveled to Israel since turning 18 on a family trip, a multi-generational trip, or some interfaith/ secular experiences are eligible.

Additional Restrictions

- Must have graduated high school
- Have not lived in Israel since the age of 12
- Have not served in the Israeli Army
- Not currently registered in a Jewish Studies program in any institute of higher learning such as Jewish Teacher Training program, Jewish Studies program, Rabbinic program, Yeshiva/Seminary, Jewish Communal Service program, etc.
- Must have a current United States address (be a resident/citizen/full-time student in the United States). However, applicants living in Canada are eligible to take part in a Specialty Trip (www.israeloutdoors. com/the-trips/specialty-groups/) or Israel By Bike (www.israeloutdoors.com/the-trips/israel-by-bike/) departing from the United States.

UNSURE ABOUT YOUR ELIGIBILITY?

Many applicants wonder if they are "Jewish enough" for a trip. Others are concerned about coming from an interfaith household. And some feel they've just lost their connection to Judaism. If you are unsure if you are eligible for a trip, we encourage you to e-mail info@israeloutdoors.com or call 202-537-0006 in advance and ask. ■




