

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Can almost hear the pop of hardballs and softballs caught in leather gloves as we find ourselves on the cusp of spring. It's not just baseball in the air; soon we will look out on our meadow and see those signs of spring we all so look forward to: the rebirth and renewal that is the greening of the world we love. The approach of spring is a perfect time to reenergize and re-engage in your Congregation and our March programming gives all of us at least four great ways to do that:

- 1. *Tikun Olam* Award. While we are right up against the deadline to sign up for our *Tikun Olam* award ceremony, there is still time for you to participate on Sunday March 8th at 3PM when we present our *Tikun Olam* award to Steven Scott Bradley. We will be joined by over 50 members of his congregation, the historic First African Baptist Church of Sharon Hill, Pennsylvania and will revel in the music of their choir. This is one of our three big fundraisers that bridge the gap between membership dues and fees, and what it takes to keep our congregation going. Please join us or send a contribution to celebrate Steve's great work and your great synagogue.
- 2. Vote on our Proposed By-Law Changes. Join us on Sunday March 8th, from 11 to 12:30 for Q&A and to vote on the proposed changes to the by-laws that guide our congregation. You should have received the changes by e-mail and if not, please contact Elaine Stevens or me immediately so we can get them to you. We need 15% of our 180 families in good standing to be at some part of this meeting to have a valid vote and we then need 50.1% positive vote on each of the proposed changes for the change to pass.
- 3. Celebrate Shabbat Across America on Friday night, March 13th. This is a special service where we invite all our prospective members to come and worship with us and learn more about our community. I'd like you to mark your calendar to join us that night and reach out to our guests and start a conversation about why you love being a part of Kol Ami.
- 4. **Continue to engage with Israel**. Kol Ami is committed to Israel. We encourage all our members to visit Israel and are proud of our Discover Israel Fund that supports our teens who travel to Israel on an approved teen trip. Over the years we have sponsored a variety of conversations and presentations about Israel, including bringing Seeds of Peace to our sanctuary, spending a *Shabbat* evening with Elad Strohmayer, the Philadelphia Deputy Consul General of Israel, and encouraging our members to attend AIPAC's annual conference, to name but a few. March brings two great ways to continue the dialogue and learning:

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Rabbi Elliot J. Holin

In response to requests for Rabbi Holin's sermon on January 23, we present it below:

DEDICATION OF OUR CONGREGATION'S YAHRZEIT WALL

The reason that many of us are here tonight on the *erev Shabbat* that we are dedicating our beautiful *Yahrzeit* Wall is in recognition of the need to remember: to consciously recall moments and loved ones.

In the Book of Exodus, Moses told the newly liberated people: "Remember this day on which you departed from Egypt, from the house of bondage" (Exodus 13:3). The great rabbinic commentator, Rashi, focused on the imperative of the word <code>zachor/</code>"Remember" – from which the Hebrew word for "memory"/ <code>zih'kah'rone</code> derives – and he said that we must remember the exodus every single day. That commandment is fulfilled in the third paragraph of the <code>Sh'ma</code>, recited daily, which concludes with the statement: "I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt" (Numbers 15:37-41).

Rashi emphasized the importance of remembering, with the coda that one must remember our exodus from Egypt every single day: a tall order, to say the least. If we cannot recall that imperative every day, then the frequency with which the words "Remember that you were slaves in the land of Egypt" occur in the *Torah* is understandable. That phrase is repeated 36 times, more than any other in the Five Books of Moses: to remember the precious gift of freedom and to help liberate others from their shackles.

There are different ways to remember our loved ones: thinking about someone whose soul is in the *olam ha'ba*/"the world to come"; saying *kaddish* is a time honored way to do so; establishing a fund in his or her name is another; and one of the most tangible ways to do so is the dedication of a *yahrzeit* plaque. Since we cannot remember "every single day," to quote Rashi, the sight of a *yahrzeit* plaque in memory of a loved one engages our memory, especially the knowledge that it is here, in the sanctuary, the house of God.

Many of you remember the *yahrzeit* wall that awaited us when we arrived here in 2006. It was on the wall just beyond the steps to the right side of the *bimah* as you face it. To say that it was unappealing is a massive understatement. It is possible that many of us, upon seeing it, determined that we would someday replace it with a *Yahrzeit* Wall far more impressive and, in fact, beautiful.

The resolve to do so involved several years of thought and planning: visiting synagogues in our area and on the Mainline to see other *yahrzeit* walls; and the conception of designs that enabled us to develop our vision for our *Yahrzeit* Wall that we dedicate this evening. I want to express my personal gratitude, and our Congregation's appreciation, to Jennifer Streitwieser, Bart Weiner, Karol Appel, and Elaine Stevens, whose dedication to this sacred endeavor was exemplary, and to Jeff Cohen under whose watch as our president this task was completed.

Some of you know that when I was living in Israel many years ago, my parents came to visit me in Jerusalem. It was also the first time, post-Holocaust, that my father had seen his brother in decades, and an indelible memory—*zih'kah'rone*—is continued page 5





the sight of the two of them greeting each other at my uncle's apartment in Bnai Braq, an Orthodox neighborhood in Tel Aviv. They fell into each other's arms and stood there in heartfelt embrace, rooted to the spot, speechless with the wonder of it all.

A bit later, we walked to the neighborhood synagogue, my father and uncle arm-in-arm. When we entered the sanctuary, my uncle brought my Dad to the yahrzeit wall and pointed to the memorial plaques on which the names of their parents were engraved. They simultaneously lifted their hands toward the plaques and let their fingertips rest on them for a few moments. That gesture and the reverence inherent in it is similar to what one does upon blessing the Torah: the tallit is extended to the first word of the text that is being read or chanted, and then the tallit is kissed before the blessing is recited. My father and uncle did not kiss their fingers after they had touched the memorial plaques, perhaps to make the distinction between touching the sacred scroll of the Torah with a tallit, and theirs is a custom that I have continued. Whenever I pass by our Yahrzeit Wall, I touch my fingertips to my parents' yahrzeit plaques and linger for a moment.

Yahrzeit is a Yiddish word that means "year time": hence the acknowledgement of the "anniversary" of a death. Traditionally, a person observing the yahrzeit of a loved one is called to the Torah during a weekday service on which the yahrzeit is observed, or on the preceding Shabbat. A 24-hour memorial candle is lit on the eve of the day of the observance, symbolic of the phrase in the Book of Proverbs: "The soul is the lamp of God" (Proverbs 20:27). Devotion to family has made yahrzeit one of the most widely held observances in Judaism. The yahrzeit plaque is tangible, heartfelt evidence of piety. On some memorial walls, electric bulbs-

FASTS THIS MONTH AND NEXT

(and a new addition for our *mitzvot*!)

Join Rabbi Holin in fast days—or virtual fast days—every month, no matter where you are, by sending funds that you would have spent on food to help men, women, and children in need:

Camp Hometown Heroes. Since September 11, 2001, almost 5,000 children have lost a parent who served in the U.S. Military. Their deaths have been the result of combat, accident, illness, or suicide. Their children have been present during a gun salute and flag presentation by an Honor Guard, and many of them face depression, profound grief, isolation, and a sense of helplessness.

Camp Hometown Heroes began in 2013 in partnership with pediatric grief counselors to provide a free, weeklong overnight summer camp for children and siblings between the ages of 7 and 17. The children participate in art and music therapy groups and have the opportunity to openly discuss their feelings through shared, common bonds of loss.

Since the camp opened in June 2013, 62 children from 14 states have participated free of charge. In 2014, Camp Hometown Heroes welcomed more than 100 children who came to Wisconsin all the way from Hawaii, Idaho, California, and Washington.

Their parents, no longer alive, served our nation. This is our opportunity to stand with their children.

Forthcoming fast days to benefit **Camp Hometown Heroes** will be on **Tuesday, March 3**, and **Tuesday, April 7**.

NATAL (nah'tahl), the Israel Trauma Center for Victims of Terror and War. NATAL addresses Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder of combat veterans and former prisoners of war, as well as those who have lost loved ones in battle or suicide bombings, and anyone who suffers the sustained emotional and mental pressure of living with the fear and uncertainty that war and the threat of war bring. In addition, NATAL reaches out to families and relatives of victims and bereaved families through on-site counseling, a national hotline, and free or subsidized psychological assistance and treatment by highly trained professionals.

"For some children, the color red is not just a color."

During Operation Protective Edge, NATAL answered thousands of calls every day and night from children and adults. Clinical staff and highly trained volunteers were enlisted to respond to this increased need. Working with Israel's media, millions of people received information about when, where, and how to get help. NATAL's emergency kits consist of information about trauma and methods of staying calm, as well as therapeutic tools to aid in managing tension. There is still a strong demand for thousands of these kits to be distributed to individuals, schools, and communities throughout Israel.

Forthcoming fast days on behalf of **NATAL** will be on **Wednesday, March 11**, and **Wednesday, April 8**

Phast for Philadelphia is on behalf of unemployed workers in Philadelphia who are struggling to make ends meet by helping them pay their mortgages, address health-care needs, and pay electric bills.

Forthcoming **Phast for Philadelphia** fast days will be on **Thursday, March 26**, and **Thursday, April 30**.





symbolic of the words: "The soul is the lamp of God"-are turned on next to the names of those whose yahrzeits are being observed: a practice, not a custom, that we veered away from in favor of placing plaques on the center column for the week of the Shabbat during which their yahrzeit falls. We feel that the beauty of our Yahrzeit Wall, and the central position of those plaques when their yahrzeit is observed, is eloquent testimony to the love felt in the hearts of those who remember them.

Memory is such an important part of our tradition, Biblical narratives, and ritual observance. Zachor u'shmore: "Remember and observe" we read in the Book of Deuteronomy (5:15). However, our avote v'imahote-our ancestors-were wise enough to know that memory alone is not enough: it must be harnessed to deed.

What do we do with memory as it relates to the recitation of kaddish or the observance of yahrzeit? Leon Wieseltier, author of an epic work called "Kaddish," writes: "The mourner must be bettered by the death he [or she] bemoans. Death is a communication to the living." 1 When Wieseltier dwelt upon the personal matter of saying kaddish and observing yahrzeit, he wrote: "My father's death was the occasion for a reckoning with how I live."2

Allow me to revisit two of those sentences because I think they are so pertinent to our presence here tonight: "Death is a communication to the living" and "My father's death was the occasion for a reckoning with how I live."

The dedication of a yahrzeit plaque is personal and profound. It is meaningful and moving. The presence of memorial plaques dedicated to our loved ones inspires us to consider in tangible ways what they mean to us even as space and time from the dates of their deaths expand. This is one of the ways that they remain close.

BAR MITZVAH OF JONATHAN WARSAW

SATURDAY, MARCH 14, AT 10:00 A.M.



Jonathan is in the seventh grade at Cedarbook Middle School. He enjoys reading and creative writing, and music is particularly enjoyable because he plays the saxophone and finds it terrific that a whole class is dedicated to music.

At school he is involved in the National Junior Honor Society, and at religious school he participates in our Stop Hunger Now program. He also joins his family on occasion to walk greyhounds at

the greyhound rescue.

"My favorite holy days are Pesach and Purim because they both have special foods. For Pesach, there is the Seder, and for Purim, there are hamantashen. Also, on Pesach, there is the search for the afikomen, and on Purim, we dress up.

"My favorite prayers are the V'ahavtah and the Avote v'Imahote. They are both fun to sing and teach us something important. The theme of the V'ahavtah is love for God and passing down the teachings, traditions, and values of our faith. This is important to me because it ties me to the previous generations of Jews and inspires me to carry on the traditions and live a life that demonstrates the important values of Judaism, like treating people with respect and devotion to tikun olam. The Avote v'Imahote honors all our ancestors who got us here today. It is important to honor those who came before us and recognize that we are where we are today because of their wisdom, strength, and bravery.

"One of the things I enjoy about being Jewish is religious school. Of course, I like being here with my friends, but I also like what we study. I like that we talk about important issues in the world and how the Torah and the lessons of the past can help us make decisions and judgments in the present. I also like that Judaism and our religious school encourage us to question in order to learn.

"My Torah portion is not the most exciting of all Torah portions. Most of it is just a long list of items used in the building of the Tabernacle. Though some of the items were intriguing, like dolphin skin in the desert, they certainly weren't as interesting as betrayals, sacrifices, and plagues. I chose to chant verses from Exodus, chapters 35 and 36 of Torah Portion Va'yakhel because they include dialogue between Moses and the Israelites, and in particular the commandment to cease work on Shabbat.

I was motivated to study for my Bar Mitzvah because I want to be prepared and know what I will be doing during the service. Becoming a Bar Mitzvah will be an important day in my life because Judaism teaches that on that day, I will become a responsible adult member of the community. Part of showing my responsibility was making the commitment to prepare and study both at home and with the Rabbi and Rebecca."

PARENTS CIRCLE FAMILIES FORUM

a dialogue to sustain hope for peace in the Middle East Thursday, March 26, from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. in our Sanctuary

The Parents Circle Families Forum (PCFF) is a joint Israeli-Palestinian organization of more than 600 bereaved families whose common bond is that they have lost a close family member to the conflict. However, instead of choosing revenge, they have chosen a path of reconciliation. Through dialogue, they have brought together tens of thousands of Israelis and Palestinians through their personal journeys of reconciliation. It is often emotional, but out of these interactions, change is possible on personal levels.

Their stories and the credibility of their losses, and the uncommon path they have chosen, have opened minds and hearts. They stir an awareness that transcends history and politics. For many, it is the first time that they have seen "the other side" as human.

PCFF believes that reconciliation between the Israeli and Palestinian people is essential to ensure that peace is sustainable and is eager to share the human side of the conflict with the American public in order to foster the peace and reconciliation process.

Join PCFF's international spokespeople and bereaved members, Robi Damelin and Bassam Aramin, as they share their stories of loss and their unique choice of reconciliation. Participate in a discussion on the human side of the conflict and why relationship building, mutual understanding of the "other side," and a reconciliation framework is necessary for any sustainable peace agreement.

ROBI DAMELIN grew up in South Africa and resisted apartheid before moving to Israel and starting a family. Her son, David, a peace activist and a member of the IDF reserves, was killed by a Palestinian sniper. Since then, she has dedicated her life to ending the violence and to creating a collaborative, formal truth-and-reconciliation process that will be ready to roll out when a political peace agreement is reached. She co-leads the PCFF's Women's Group. Her efforts have been the subject of several documentaries.

BASSAM ARAMIN was sent to Israeli prison as a 17 year old for his role in the Palestinian resistance. He spent seven years there and eventually started questioning the value of armed resistance. Several years after his release, he co-founded "Combatants for Peace." He has refused to pick up arms since his release, even when, in 2007, his 10-year-old daughter, Abir, was killed by an Israeli soldier's rubber bullet on her way home from school. He is also the subject of a documentary film, "Within the Eye of the Storm." He is just completing his PhD in Holocaust Studies.

KABBALAT SHABBAT - A DIFFERENT TASTE OF SHABBAT

Friday, March 27, a brief service from 6:30 to 7:00 p.m.; followed by pre-ordered dinner and discussion

Kabbalat Shabbat is a phrase that designates the eagerness with which we prepare to "receive the Shabbat." We have a new way here at Kol Ami to do so!

In the past, informal discussions that have commenced at our 6:45 p.m. dinners on *erev Shabbat* have been brought to their conclusions as we gather for our 7:30 p.m. *erev Shabbat* service.

Now, a different format arrives—a brief, half-hour service at 6:30 p.m. followed by a predetermined discussion over dinner. The night extends at leisure!

This is the lesson that Wieseltier shares with us in his book. When the first Sukkot arrived following his father's death, the usher in shul said to him: "We would like to give you your father's honor. I am asked to hold the Torah in the middle of the leafy parade. I hold the Torah and they march around me. The Torah and I, we are surrounded. I hold it, then hug it, then wrap my arms all around it, tighter and tighter and tighter. I sway with it. A few friends ask if I would like to join the procession, and they offer their branches and fruits for me to carry. To their surprise, I decline. I tell them that I am lucky to have the Torah in my arms for so long. I lean my head against it. I can hear the parchment crackling beneath its white velvet sheath. All I can think is that I love it. It is the physical embodiment of the sanctity of words. Before I restore the Torah to its place in the ark, I kiss it. I am grateful for the time we had together."3

We are grateful for the time we had with our loved ones, and, if we were fortunate, to have been in their arms for so long. We extol their memories as well as the memories of those we were not privileged to know, who are also part of us.

Five Hebrew words from the Book of Psalms are on our *Yahrzeit* Wall:

ושבתי בבית יהוה לארך ימים

"I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever" (Psalm 23:6).


The names of our loved ones, engraved on memorial plaques, dwell in our minds and hearts, and here in our sanctuary, in the *makom*/the place where God is most manifest.


