FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Rabbi Elliot J. Holin

Wrestling.

It is the precise word that describes my state of mind and the turmoil in my heart as I enter this season of the High Holy Days. If ever I needed the insights, clarity, and tranquility that meditation and prayer offer, it is now. Ours is a world and nation in turmoil. I have so many questions and concerns, and few answers.

Each day dawns with a longer list of challenges. They arrive from beyond and create turmoil within. I try to shrink the larger world into a more manageable sphere: the spaces in which I move. I have never felt so detached and so engaged at the same time.

Jacob, our patriarch the wrestler, calls to me from ancient times. He is my namesake, and yours as well.

On the eve of meeting his brother, Esau, 22 years after they were last together – a separation fueled by deceit and rage – Jacob sent his brother an olive branch. He wanted to talk, but he wasn't sure what to say or how to engage.

Late that evening, he sat by the Jabbok river, a twist of the letters of his name: a hint about his confusion and inner turmoil. He wrestled throughout the night with a Divine messenger, or perhaps it was his conscience. As dawn arrived, a metaphor for awareness, he was exhausted. Still, he clung to the messenger, the conveyor of his deepest thoughts, doubts, and yearnings.

The Divine messenger told him it was time to break from this struggle, addressing its own eagerness to be on the way! Suddenly, it was Jacob who had leverage. He demanded a blessing and received a new name: *Yisrael* (Israel) instead of *Ya'akove* (Jacob). In that moment, he was transformed through the realization of what the messenger told him: "You have struggled with God and with human beings, and you have prevailed" (Genesis 32:28).

He prevailed not just because the messenger's release was won by his forceful negotiation – "I will not let you go unless you bless me" – but because throughout the night of wrestling, he learned more about himself. Weary, yes, but wiser too.

When he and Esau met a few hours later, Jacob said, "God has been gracious to me, and I have all that I need" (Genesis 33:11). The brothers embraced and, for now, that was all that he needed. His life was back in balance and that was the greatest blessing.

I enter these High Holy Days wrestling with the world and with God. I know that God has been gracious to me, and yet I pray for more: not more of anything tangible, but rather the ineffable that will bring me a greater sense of peace in a world that deserves the same.

PREPARING FOR THE HIGH HOLY DAYS

Selichot Service and Discussion, Saturday, September 5, at 10:00 p.m.

The *Selichot* Service is our annual "call to conscience" as we take measure of who we are, what we value, and the distance between what we say and do. In our tradition, the process of repentance commences a full month before the New Year, and the *Selichot* Service is part of a journey that leads to new beginnings: the ten days on the Jewish calendar that we call "high" and "holy."

In Hebrew, the word *selichah* means "forgiveness," and during this service, we will discuss Rabbi Lawrence Hoffman's article in the introduction to the *Rosh Hashanah Machzor* – High Holy Day prayer book – "Why Sin Still Matters, or What's a Heaven For?"

TASHLIKH SERVICE - THE LITERAL (!) BRIDGE TO YOM KIPPUR

Tuesday, September 15, at the home of Ruben Honik in Philadelphia

Join us over a home-hosted *pareve* dinner at 5:15 p.m. and at the *Tashlikh* Service at 6:30 p.m. on a bridge in Wissahickon Valley Park overlooking Wissahickon Creek near Valley Green, a short walk from Ruben's home.

The view from the bridge is breathtaking, as if one is in a national park!

Tashlikh, from the Hebrew word meaning "to send forth," is a service of readings and reflections from Psalms and Prophetic writings. Dating back to the Middle Ages, the *Tashlikh* Service is a tribute to the Creator to whose work of creation the fish were the first witnesses, hence the proximity to a natural body of water ("Let waters bring forth swarms of living creatures"). We will symbolically cast our transgressions across the water to be carried away, preparing us for the Day of Atonement just a week later, at *Kol Nidrei* on Tuesday, September 22. *continued next page*

- Ruben's address is in the synagogue directory or can be obtained by calling the synagogue office: there is space in his driveway for 10 cars. There is additional parking on the grassy berm on Scotforth Road, just below his house.
- The entry point to the path that leads to the bridge is a 5-minute, downhill walk from Ruben's home, and cars can proceed from his driveway to an adjacent parking lot for anyone who chooses not to walk.
- The path from the parking lot to the bridge is a 5-minute, downhill walk defined by small stones and small tree roots: be sure to wear comfortable walking shoes, and we will give support to anyone along the way.
- If you are unable to join us for dinner, meet us on the bridge at 6:30 p.m.

PLAN TO ARRIVE EARLY FOR OUR KOL NIDREI SERVICE

Our *Kol Nidrei* Service will begin at 8:00 p.m. on September 22, preceded by meditative readings and the kindling of a *neyr n'shamah* – a memorial candle. We pray in the names of those no longer with us as we commence *Yom Kippur*: **Please arrive between 7:45 and 8:00 p.m. in silence** so that everyone seated in the sanctuary will have time and quietude to read the meditative offerings. As the service commences at 8:00 p.m., we will say the blessings over the *neyr n'shamah* as well as the candles of *Shabbat* and *Yom Kippur*.

Chaim Nachman Bialik (1873-1934) - Israel's National Poet

Instructor: Rabbi Elliot Holin Tuesday mornings from 10:30 to 11:45 a.m. September 29; October 6 & 13 (3 Sessions)



Best known for his epic poem written in 1903, "In the City of Slaughter," a scream of anguish following the brutality of the Kishinev pogroms, precursor to the flames of the Holocaust that would be kindled 30 years later, Bialik's words urged a reawakening of the Jewish people in the face of anti-Semitism and in the name of

national identity (Zionism). Other poems contain fulsome praise for the synagogue ("Should You Wish to Know the Source") and the *Shabbat* ("*Sabbath* Queen").

We will read and discuss these three works in the context of the times, and their power to move and inspire to this day.

Psychoanalysis and the Bible

Myths, fables, and stories often capture important truths about our lives. This is a reason the greatest ones lasted and were passed down from generation to generation. Sigmund Freud once wrote: "Everywhere I go, I find a poet has been there before me."

We will examine the following stories: the creation story, the Garden of Eden, Noah and the flood, the binding of Isaac, Jacob's dream of the ladder and wrestling with an angel, the Israelites' exodus from Egypt, and Jonah and the whale. We will also examine parallels between the *Kabbalah* and psychoanalysis.

ORLY MARAVANKIN has spent 20 years in global consulting before founding Edge Consulting, a boutique managementconsulting company specializing in growth strategy and organizational development. Orly has recently become a Chopra Center University certified meditation teacher. She incorporates broad meditation principles into her workshops on emotional intelligence, leadership resilience, and mindfulness in the workplace. Orly holds a Ph.D. in psychology and is an International Coaching Federation certified executive coach.

CARY MAZER, Ph.D., has been teaching theatre history and dramatic literature at the University of Pennsylvania for 36 years, where he chaired the undergraduate Theatre Arts Program for 24 years. He did his undergraduate degree at Princeton and his Ph.D. (in Theatre) at Columbia. He has directed (at Penn), worked as a theatre critic (for the City Paper) and as a guest dramaturg (at People's Light and Theatre), and is the author of two books, an edited volume, and two plays, both on Jewish themes. His scholarship is about Shakespeare in performance.

RABBI SEYMOUR ROSENBLOOM is the Distinguished Service Rabbi of Congregation Adath Jeshurun in Elkins Park and is active in the local Jewish and general communities. At the end of June 2014, he retired after 36 years as AJ's rabbi. Ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary in 1972, he is known as a thought-provoking teacher. His classes seek to stimulate his students to uncover their core beliefs, encounter our tradition's teachings, and come to their own conclusions about their individual identification and growth as Jews. He was recently elected president of the Jewish Social Policy Action Network (JSPAN), a Jewish organization that advocates for progressive causes from the perspective of the Jewish ethical tradition. Words That Have Spoken to Us through the Ages

Instructor: Rabbi Elliot Holin Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. April 14 & 21 (2 Sessions)

Psalms 23, 121, and 137 are among the best known and most-often recited among our writings. What is it about their power to move us? Why are they the cry of the soul in times of doubt or loss, and as affirmations of faith? We will have the opportunity to study the verses and discuss what they mean, and how they speak to us.

- **Psalm 23**: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want...You restore my soul...Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil... Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me."
- **Psalm 121**: "I lift up my eyes to the mountains, from where shall my help come? My help comes from God... The Holy One who protects you will not slumber... God shall guard your going out and your coming in from this time forth and forever."
- **Psalm 137**: "By the rivers of Babylon, there we sat down and wept when we remembered Zion...If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget how to perform rituals, let my tongue stick to the roof of my mouth."

The Book of Job: God, Truth, and Psychoanalysis

The myth of Job, like other popular stories in the Bible, has lasted countless generations because it contains key emotional truths about life, especially how to deal with suffering, trauma, and change. These are also themes that psychoanalysis addresses. We will examine parallels between the Book of Job and current psychoanalytic theory.

We will also compare the story of Job to the myth of Jonah, who runs from God/truth and to the myth of Jacob who wrestles with God/truth. What do the Bible and psychoanalysis teach us about dealing with life's difficulties and traumas?

For the past year and a half, our rabbi's monthly fasts have benefitted **NATAL** (*nah'tahl*): **Israel's Trauma Center for Victims of Terror and War** NATAL addresses Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder of combat veterans and former prisoners of war, as well as those who have lost loved ones in battle or suicide bombings, and anyone who suffers the sustained emotional and mental pressure of living with the fear and uncertainty

that war and the threat of war bring. In addition, NATAL reaches out to families and relatives of victims and bereaved families through on-site counseling, a national hotline, and free or subsidized psychological assistance and treatment by highly trained professionals.

Forthcoming fast days on behalf of **NATAL** will be on **Tuesday, September 8**, and **Tuesday, October 6**.

For the past four years, rabbi's monthly fasts are called **PHAST FOR PHILADELPHIA** on behalf of unemployed workers in Philadelphia who are struggling to make ends meet by helping them pay their mortgages, address health-care needs, and pay electric bills. ARTIST OF THE MONTH FLORENCE MOONAN




"While listening to the music of Puccini as I work, I am transported. If I can't sing it, I will paint it." Florence Moonan's passion for the arts springs from bits and pieces from her memories, life events, family mementos, travel, and, above all, music. As a child, she was involved in the visual and performing arts at home, school, and local summer theater. Her heart was set on becoming a performer, but a gift set of acrylics from her father, a self-taught artist, redirected her focus. She returned to her early roots and began painting at home while raising a family. The color and texture of her painted surfaces in this show reveal a glimpse into her inner thoughts and emotions. She has created an exhibition of stirring artwork by mixing and persuading a variety of mediums that have been layered, sanded, and hand-rubbed to expose paintings of quiet yet dynamic beauty. The major component in this body of work is acrylic venetian plaster, a medium she selects for its unique qualities that help her produce appealing surfaces. Her aim is to engage the viewer and evoke memories of their own experiences.

Moonan, who lives on a hillside in Stockton, New Jersey, has won numerous awards for her artwork that is included in permanent collections in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Her list of exhibitions is extensive and includes shows in Texas, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey. Her work was selected for Abington Art Center's 2014 summer solo series; The Gallery at Hillside Square (solo 2014), Montclair, New Jersey; and the Trenton City Museum (solo 2012). Group exhibitions include: Hunterdon Art Museum; Hunterdon County Cultural and Heritage Commission's invitational biennial; Library of Life at Philadelphia's Art in City Hall; Sculpture New Hope 2015, and Abstraction Revisited at the New Hope Arts Center. Her work will be included in Abstraction at Trenton City Museum this September, and the Pennswood Art Gallery will feature her work in January 2016. While employed full-time at The College of New Jersey, she enrolled as a part-time student in the Art department, developed a portfolio, and in time, earned a BFA summa cum laude. Since retiring from the College in 2007, she is occupied fulltime with painting and exhibiting.

Beverly will be reviewing "Panic in A Suitcase," by Yelena Akhtiorskaya, a 30-year-old Ukrainian-American author whose novel parallels her own comingof-age in Brighton Beach, Brooklyn, as a member of her immigrant family. Transforming many of her experiences into fiction, her novel traces the lives of the Nasmertov family who left their

home in Odessa for Brighton Beach to begin again in the United States. Torn between the old world and the new, family members struggle with the tugs of their native country and the pull of succeeding in America. The novel also poses the age-old question: Can you go home again?

Yelena Akhtiorskaya has been recognized as one of the "5 under 35" gifted writers by the National Book Foundation and is one of the many Russian/Ukrainian young authors whose work is being touted by the Jewish community and the community at large. Her life and work will also serve as a gateway to the One Book, One Jewish Community selection this year.



- Tour Ammunition Hill, site of a crucial battle between the IDF and Jordanian forces that played a major role in the liberation of the Old City of Jerusalem
- Embark on a docent-led tour of the **Knesset**, Israel's seat of government
- · Prepare to leave for the airport to return home


SOCIAL ACTION FAIR
