FOUR PASSOVER QUESTIONS, ANSWERED

1. What can I use instead of a shank-bone if I'm a vegetarian?

The shank-bone or *zeroa* is a symbol of the paschal lamb the Israelites sacrificed on the first Passover. The blood of this lamb was smeared on our doorposts in Egypt so the Angel of Death would know which homes to pass over. After the destruction of the Temple, we stopped making sacrifices, but the shank-bone served as a reminder of the original *Pesach*.

One vegetarian alternative is a roasted beet. One reason for this is textual: beets are mentioned in the Talmud (Pesachim 114b) as a possibility for one of the "two dishes" served in addition to the *matzah*, *maror*, and *charoset*. The rabbis were probably trying to determine what to eat for the main course, now that the paschal lamb was off the table.

The other reason is aesthetic: a roasted beet, like a leg of lamb, will "bleed" when you slice it. Beet juice on the doorpost might have achieved the same visual affect as lamb's blood.

Another, more lighthearted, option is to use a sweet potato as the "paschal yam."

2. Why do we have an egg on the *seder* plate?

The egg represents the *hagigah*, or festival sacrifice, made in the ancient Temple alongside the paschal lamb. It is also an option for one of the aforementioned "two dishes."

In later generations, many began to view the egg as a symbol of hope for redemption. Sherira Gaon (10th century) suggested that one should eat meat, fowl (or egg), and fish as a symbol of the heroism of Moses, Aaron, and Miriam, and also the three types of animal we will eat in the world to come: the Leviathan (a giant fish), the Wild Ox, and the Ziz (a giant bird).

In many cultures, eggs symbolize springtime and rebirth. This would explain its place in the Christian celebration of Easter, though we probably both borrowed it from some ancient pagan springtime rite. continued page 4

I like to think of the hard-boiled egg as a reminder of our people's toughness and resilience when placed in "hot water."

Because of its association with the ancient sacrificial offering, some people still roast their egg. However, remember to boil it first, or it will explode in your oven.

3. There seems to be an "extra" space on my *seder* plate. What's that for?

In the Mishnah (Pesachim 10:3, 5), the rabbis refer both to *maror*, bitter herbs, and *chazeret*, bitter lettuce. Later rabbis, not wanting to choose one herb over the other, included space for both on the *seder* plate. Nowadays, that's where most liberal Jews put their orange.

4. Oh, right, the orange...what's that for?

The orange story has so many layers that it might as well be an onion! This new *seder* symbol can be traced back to the 1980s. Organizers of early feminist seders put a crust of bread on the *seder* plate to represent Jewish lesbians, who had been told that they were no more welcome in Judaism than *chametz* on Passover.

Wanting to counter the notion that LGBTQ Jews didn't belong, Jewish feminist scholar Susannah Heschel (daughter of civil rights activist Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel) suggested replacing the bread with an orange. With its many segments, the orange suggested that there was room in the Jewish community for everyone, if only we could spit out the seeds of hatred and prejudice.

As the story became a legend, however, it took on a life of its own. Heschel notes that:

The Conscience of a Conservative Rabbi

Rabbi Seymour Rosenbloom

Friday, March 8, at 7:30 p.m. (during erev Shabbat Services)



Rabbi Seymour Rosenbloom is the Distinguished Service Rabbi of Congregation Adath Jeshurun in Elkins Park, where he served for 36 years as rabbi. A graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary, he was active in the Conservative rabbinate for 42 years when he retired four years ago. All that time, he belonged to the Rabbinical Assembly, and abided by its strict rule that no RA member may officiate at an interfaith

service. The penalty for violating the stricture is expulsion.

Rabbi Rosenbloom had long questioned the efficacy of that policy, increasingly becoming convinced that it alienated members of his own congregation, and Jews in general, from their community. When his step-daughter became engaged to someone who is not Jewish and they asked him to officiate, he agreed. Since then, he has officiated for a number of couples that are related to him by kinship, friendship, or loyalty. After writing about his experience, and urging the Rabbinical Assembly to change its policy, he was expelled from the organization despite having served in numerous leadership capacities through the years.

At *erev Shabbat* Service, Rabbi Rosenbloom will share his experience as well as his thoughts on interfaith marriage and the Conservative movement.

Privacy vs. Security? Personal Expectations vs. Unseen Risks?

As a consequence of the attacks on 9/11 and with the advances in new technology, do Americans need to reduce our expectation of privacy and accept the mass surveillance of law enforcement and intelligence agencies that has characterized the National Security policies of several recent administrations? Is maintaining privacy expectations by denying government access to available personal information that potentially could help prevent terrorist acts inherently unreasonable and inconsistent with protecting our liberty? Do the possibility of catastrophic attacks require preemptive security strategies? If so, does that alter basic assumptions on which many privacy expectations are based?

Come join one or more of these discussions in the Kol Ami Board Room led by Ira Cooperman, a former intelligence officer who has worked with the CIA, NSA, and the military. "Now the story circulates that a man said to me that a woman belongs on the *bimah* as an orange on the *seder* plate. A woman's words are attributed to a man, and the affirmation of lesbians and gay men is erased. Isn't that precisely what's happened over the centuries to women's ideas?" (The Women's Seder Sourcebook, pp. 208-210).

More important than anything we put on our *seder* plate are the people that sit around our table, and the stories we tell each other of the ongoing journey from slavery to freedom. We hope that you − and your questions − will join us for our Community *Seder* on Saturday, April 20, at 6:00 p.m. *Chag Sameach!* ■


Delaware Valley Softball League.

KOL AMI'S ARTIST OF THE MONTH JOSE CEDILLOS (MARCH 5 - APRIL 15)



Jose Cedillos received a BA in Studio Art with honors from the University of California in 1979 and a PhD in Humanistic Education in 1984 from the same university. The day after he defended his dissertation, he had a gallery show in Santa Barbara of the pieces he had created during his four-year doctoral program. Jose went on to become a professor of Education and followed teaching opportunities in six different states, also exhibiting his artwork as he moved from California to New Mexico, Colorado, Vermont, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. He then became an Assistant Dean in the Union Institute and University's PhD program of Interdisciplinary Studies before transferring to full-time faculty. Jose spent 25 years teaching adult students pattern recognition, visual thinking, and artistic improvisation as tools for understanding interdisciplinarity.

Jose is a Bricolage artist, employing happenstance, circumstance, and the accidental as basic elements in his work. "Improvisation," he says, "includes the least of things and the most of things." Every piece in the Kol Ami show is improvised without a plan, using whatever was at hand. For example, a house at the shore was cleaned out and a framed high-school project thrown in a dumpster. He salvaged it and converted it to "Boardwalk Rider (above). Jose, now a professor of Humanistic Gerontology, teaches in his classes that creativity and positive aging are two sides of the same coin. "Create and be engaged," he tells them. He is also the author of Yellow Dog Dreams, A Mexican American Memoir (2015) and Riding the Unicorn, Incursions into Visual Intelligence (2018). He converted to Judaism in 1996.

The Kol Ami gallery hours are Wednesday from 4:00-8:00 p.m. and Sunday from 10:00 a.m.-noon. If the Religious School is closed on those days, the gallery is also closed. A percentage of all displayed purchased works will be donated to Kol Ami ■


