WELCOME RACHAEL SIMON, OUR NEW DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION



On September 8, Congregation Kol Ami will welcome Rachael Simon as our new Director of Religious Education. Rachael is no stranger to our Religious School, as she has taught the children in our K-2 class for the last two years.

But she has even stronger ties to our community: Her dad, Thomas Ellis, has been a member of our congregation since 1994. Her grandparents of blessed

memory, Bud and Caryl Ellis, were also beloved members of our community. Rachael went through Kol Ami's Religious School and became a *Bat Mitz-vah* and Confirmand. Rachael, her husband, Yehoshua, and their newborn daughter, Ahava, live in Elkins Park.

Later this summer, and in the early fall, there will be opportunities for the Kol Ami community to meet Rachael in person. Until then, Board of Trustee Member Lorie Slass interviewed Rachael to help you get to know her.

So is this a homecoming of sorts?

To come back to a place where I had such a positive experience as a child is a dream come true. It is amazing because, while I was in school in later years for Jewish education, my frame of reference was definitely my experience at Kol Ami.

Did you always know this is what you wanted to do?

I actually didn't want to be in Jewish education. I studied international development with an education focus while at Georgetown. After graduation, I taught in Morocco, and I was almost always having to hide the fact that I was Jewish. That made me realize that I wanted to continue in education, but specifically Jewish education, because it is such an integral part of my identity. It fed my desire to focus on Jewish education and get my Master's degree in Jewish Education from Gratz.

How do you look back on your religious schooling at Kol Ami?

One of the things that really stood out was the community focus and the warmth that I found there, as opposed to other places where I've taught. Also, I remember when I was younger, Kol Ami always did feel very child-centered to me. Specifically, the coursework that we did always seemed based on the children's interests in the context of Jewish education.

How do you envision the future of the Religious School?

I want to take the child-centeredness a step further and have more engagement from the students, especially the older students – particularly post-*Bar/ Bat Mitzvah*. Often the older kids may not see the value in coming to Religious School anymore, and I want to involve them in choosing what they'll be learning – always grounded in Jewish teachings – but reflecting their interests.

I think another important element is to focus, from a young age, on understanding what it means to be a *Bar* or *Bat Mitzvah*. Instead of just waiting for that year and feeling pressured, I want them to better understand the Jewish *continued page 4*

ANOTHER "HAT" (A KIPPAH, OF COURSE) FOR RABBI BERKOWITZ

s of July 1, in addition to my work here at Kol Ami, I will be serving for two years as the co-president of the Women's Rabbinic Network. The WRN is very dear to my heart—not any group could convince me to take on additional leadership responsibilities! So I thought I would share a little bit about who we are, what we do, and why it is so important to me.

I first went to a WRN conference in 2013, five years after I was ordained. Previously, I hadn't felt the need to be part of a women's-only organization. Like many of my young colleagues, I thought that being educated and ordained alongside our male colleagues (and sometimes, with more women than men in a class) meant that we were equal already. The WRN didn't feel relevant.

But in those five years, I had many experiences that felt unique to women in the rabbinate: tense contract negotiations, hard bumps against the "stained-glass ceiling," and the need to point out some basic gender differences that might necessitate new ways of doing things. This stretched from the sublime—figuring out how to include women's voices in a tradition that has historically suppressed them—to the ridiculous—figuring out where to clip a mic pack when you don't have suit pockets. I began to see how the support of other women rabbis might be helpful, even necessary, to building and sustaining my rabbinate.

At my first WRN convention, I noticed that there was none of the usual posturing I had found at our larger rabbinic gatherings—inquiring or boasting about the size of congregations and success of programs, looking over one's shoulder to see if there was someone more important to talk to on the other side of the room. Instead, there was respect towards all kinds of rabbinic paths. After all, many of us had had to be creative when traditional paths were not an option. There was also a willingness to share openly about how things were really going and to offer support without judgment.

There was also a commitment to share knowledge that would be useful to us in our rabbinates. At one conference, we worked with The OpEd Project, a non-profit that seeks to broaden the range of voices found in public discourse. At this most-recent conference, we discussed gender, leadership, and Judaism with neuroscientist and actor Dr. Mayim Bialik, whose sister-in-law happens to be a Reform rabbi.

Each gathering creates space to connect with colleagues across geography and generations and provides avenues for rest and reflection. My favorite part of every meeting is the "roll call," when each year of women rabbis stands to be celebrated, starting with the most recent ordinees and stretching all the way back to Rabbi Sally Priesand, who was ordained in 1972. At our next convention, we hope to celebrate 50 years of women in the rabbinate.

Though we only gather in this way every two years, we provide support and advocacy between our conventions as well. We host regional get-togethers and online learning sessions (arranging these was my previous position on the WRN board). We promote awareness of women rabbis in the media and engage in a number of social justice initiatives. Right now, the WRN is doing *continued page 4*

SAFETY & SECURITY UPDATE

We are exploring changes in exterior lighting, keyless entry systems, concrete barriers to protect intrusion, security cameras, and more. We have filed a grant application to try to reclaim some of the costs associated with these upgrades.

What does all this mean? It means we care about each and every one of you. It means that while you are enjoying your summer, Kol Ami leaders will be hard at work making our space safer, while retaining Kol Ami's special welcoming environment.

I also want to make more distinct goals and intentions for each grade level, working closely with the teachers and the families. I want them to be involved in looking at the curriculum and taking it further.

How has it been to work with Rabbi Berkowitz?
