THOUGHTS FROM RABBI BERKOWITZ

These are a Few of My Favorite Rabbis

As we enter the Hebrew month of *Cheshvan*, we move from the rush of holidays to the more regular rhythms of Jewish life. For many of us, that means resuming our habits of lifelong Jewish learning.

Each year, as we come back around to Genesis in our weekly *Torah* reading, I select a few different commentaries to guide me through the year. This year, I chose these: <u>The Mussar *Torah* Commentary</u>, a CCAR Press anthology edited by Rabbi Barry Block, explores each *parasha* through the lens of *Mussar*, a Jewish practice of ethical discipline that focuses on cultivating our *middot* or "soul-traits" such as humility, patience, or trust. I'll also be adding <u>Unscrolled: 54 Artists and Writers Wrestle with the *Torah* to the mix for some creative content. I am still working my way through <u>Torah Journeys</u>, by Rabbi Shefa Gold, which offers a meditation practice for each weekly *Torah* portion (I started in the middle of Numbers last year).</u>

I'm also thrilled to share another incredible learning opportunity afforded to us by our pandemic-imposed virtual state. I've invited three stellar rabbis to each lead a session of learning on one of their favorite topics. Through these sessions, we can benefit from their unique perspectives and also support their rabbinic work during this challenging time.

NOVEMBER 5 AT 7:00 P.M. - RBG: The Law and Her Jewish Values — with Rabbi Cookie Olshein

Two of RBG's most famous words were: "I dissent." Together, we will uncover how RBG's Jewish values are found in her legal opinions...and why dissenting is a particularly Jewish value.



Rabbi Cookie Lea Olshein is the "Resident Rabbinic Scholar" of Congregation Ner Tamid, the largest Reform synagogue in Nevada. She spent the past 8 years as the Rabbi of Temple Israel of West Palm Beach, Florida. Before attending HUC-JIR, Rabbi Olshein practiced law in Las Vegas for almost 11 years. Combining her passion for law and Judaism, she is cur-

rently writing a book on the impact of *Torah* on the American legal system.
