Receiving the Torah in the Digital Age

Those of us who were around at the dawn of the digital age might remember a little gadget called a Palm Pilot. I received one for my college graduation, and quickly found it to be completely useless in my rabbinical studies. I still prefer scribbling things in notebooks to tapping them into a device. But there was one feature that was ahead of its time. If you had a file or application saved on your device, and you were standing near another device user, you could "beam" content from one device to the other (similar to an "AirDrop" on an iPhone).

One day, two of my classmates were comparing devices, when one mentioned that they had the entire Torah on their Palm Pilot. Obviously, this was a desirable text for any rabbinical student to have on their device. So the second student asked their friend to "beam" them the Torah. As they prepared to sync their devices, a warning popped up on the screen:

"Are you sure you want to accept 'The Torah'?"

I think of this exchange every year as we approach the holiday of Shavuot, which celebrates the moment when over a million Israelites stood at Mount Sinai and agreed to accept the Torah from God. When we stay up late studying on Erev Shavuot, and when we chant the Ten Commandments on Shavuot morning, we are reenacting that moment at the foot of Mount Sinai, when our entire people shouted, "We will do and we will listen!" Every year on Shavuot, it is as if we are standing at Sinai ourselves, preparing to receive the Torah anew. It is as if we are making a pilgrimage, once again, to the ancient Temple in Jerusalem.

We also reenact and celebrate this moment through the ritual of Confirmation, when we invite our 10th and 11th graders to affirm their commitment to this covenant, and share with us their own new wisdom and insights.

Last year, because we did not have a whole class that was ready to be confirmed, we did not have to answer the questions we face now: What does it look like to celebrate this milestone during a pandemic? What does it look like to "accept the Torah" over Zoom?

While we still have logistical questions to address in this area, we already have a lot of data on how we might receive Torah during this time. We have always received the Torah in many different ways: through the prayers in the siddur, by engaging in Torah study, and by committing ourselves to living up to the ideals of social justice that the Torah lays out.

Over this past year and a half, we have discovered a plethora of new ways to receive Torah. There are <u>daily podcasts about the Talmud</u>, as well as one-time and ongoing online courses from many major Jewish learning institutions. Using technology, we've been able to cross both geographical and financial barriers to access learning with some of the greatest scholars of our time. And we've continued to connect with one another weekly to study the Torah portion during our Shabbat morning services.

So while we would much prefer to bless our confirmands in person (and will hopefully do so someday soon!), there's something fitting about having this generation of students receive the Torah and affirm their commitment to Judaism online. So much of the Torah they will receive in their lifetimes will be through some kind of new technology, much of which likely hasn't even been invented yet. Who knows, they might be the ones to discover creative new ways to transmit our people's wisdom to the next generation.

Learning virtually for an entire year certainly has been a unique challenge for our students, parents, teachers, and Director. If you or your student is interested in continuing to practice Hebrew over the summer, I've listed a few resources below. Nevertheless, I urge you not to worry about your child's Hebrew and any "learning loss" you think may have occurred this year. We will work closely with each child to make sure every student is progressing in Hebrew once we return in the fall.

If your child is interested, here are a few ways to continue to work on Hebrew in the summer:

- **Attending Shabbat services** is the surest way to retain the knowledge of prayers that your child has gained this year. It is also a great way for students to maintain a connection to the wider Kol Ami community.
- **Jewishinterative.org** offers several Hebrew games for all levels, from Aleph Bet practice to basic reading to Modern Hebrew vocabulary. The games are great for students and parents to learn together!
- **Hebrew by Nemo** is a free Hebrew learning app. This is another great way for the whole family to learn together in a fun and interactive way.
- **YouTube videos from Shalom Sesame and Bim Bam** teach Hebrew letters, phrases, and prayers. Just search for either on YouTube to subscribe to their channels.
- Each child received a **Hebrew textbook** that they have been using in class this year. The texts include many fun activities that they may not have had time to complete in class. You may want to bring these books on a road trip for some practice in the car or pull them out on a rainy day.

SUPPORT LOCAL FARMS WITH YOUR FORK: Organic Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) at Congregation Kol Ami

In our 15th year, Congregation Kol Ami is proud to offer a Jewish Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. We were the first in our region to align with *Hazon*, a national nonprofit that links Jewish tradition with environmental action. Through its CSA network, *Hazon* uses Jewish purchasing power to support local organic farmers, foster vibrant Jewish communities who care about environmental and educational issues, and examine food and environmental issues from a Jewish perspective.

The *Hazon* CSA at Kol Ami partners with over 100 Amish and Mennonite organic farmers from Lancaster Farm Fresh Cooperative (LFFC). The diversity of crops among LFFC farmers ensures a good variety of fresh-picked seasonal produce each week. Enrollment keeps local sustainable farms and local food safe for future generations.

Our CSA is comprised of members from the local community. We safely distribute fresh, locally grown, organic vegetables, fruit, eggs, cheese and herbal medicines each week on Tuesday evenings from the Congregation Kol Ami kitchen.

The CSA at Kol Ami operates from late April through October for the Summer season, followed by a Fall season that ends in December. We are working on an alternative space in Elkins Park to distribute the CSA when we officially need to move due to the sale of our property.
