RABBI BERKOWITZ TO TEACH ABOUT CELEBRATING 50 YEARS OF WOMEN IN THE RABBINATE

On June 3, 1972, Sally Priesand was ordained as a rabbi. She was the first woman to be publicly ordained by a major seminary. Almost 36 years later, on May 4, 2008, I was ordained as a rabbi, something that was only possible because of Rabbi Priesand's vision and tenacity.

Both of us followed a somewhat straight path to the rabbinate. We began thinking about the possibility of becoming rabbis as teenagers, enrolled in undergraduate courses in Jewish Studies (me at Brandeis University, she as part of a joint program between the University of Cincinnati and Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.) We were both passionate about working in congregations, and we both had the unconditional support of our families, which made it easier for us to imagine that such a career was possible.

I was surprised to learn that, even though she was ordained nearly four decades before me, Rabbi Priesand didn't think her choice was particularly radical. She writes:

"When I decided to study for the rabbinate, I never thought much about being a pioneer, nor was it my intention to champion the rights of women. I just wanted to be a rabbi."

THOUGHTS FROM RABBI BERKOWITZ (continued)

This is a sentiment I wholeheartedly share. When I started rabbinical school, I wouldn't have even called myself a feminist. But, like Rabbi Priesand, I found that ordination was only the beginning of the challenges that women face as Jewish professionals. This is one reason I am proud to work with the Women's Rabbinic Network, which provides support for women rabbis and advocates for safe and respectful workplaces, pay equity, and paid family leave.

As we prepare to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Rabbi Priesand's ordination, I am excited to offer a four-session course on the history of women rabbis. We'll have an opportunity to learn together about the many centuries of women's leadership prior to the 20th-century, the obstacles we have overcome, and the stained-glass ceilings we still need to shatter.

While we will discuss the lives and careers of many incredible women, I want to make sure everyone knows that THIS CLASS IS NOT ONLY FOR WOMEN! I hope that people of all gender identities and expressions will be a part of this conversation about how far we've come, and how far we still need to go.

2022 marks the 50th anniversary of the ordination of Sally J. Priesand, the first woman publicly ordained as a rabbi. Yet her groundbreaking ordination, which opened the door for subsequent generations of women, was preceded by the impactful lives of other, lesser-known female scholars and community leaders. In this four-session adult education series, we will spotlight a few of the significant women from the 1500's to the early modern period who held quasi-rabbinic status in their communities; compare and contrast the ordinations of Rabbis Sally Priesand and Regina Jonas (Who? Come find out!); explore the challenges faced by the first generation of women in the rabbinate; and reflect on how women's leadership has changed the rabbinate and the Jewish community as a whole.

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CO-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE FROM BEN ADAMS

January 16-17 will mark the festival of Tu B'Shvat – a date in the Hebrew calendar (literally the 15th – or "Tu" – in the month of Shvat) with agrarian origins in the Mishnah, where it is referred to as the "New Year of the Trees" (Mishnah Rosh Hashanah 1:1). Observed until the destruction of the second temple in 70 CE, Tu B'Shvat was ritually revived by the Kabbalists of the 16TH century as a "seder" celebration – an "ordered" meal much like the Passover seder, revolving around plant-based food and drink awash with symbolism.

Today, Tu B'Shvat fulfills our need to tie our Jewish spirituality with our place in the environment. Just as we reflect at Rosh Hashanah on our relationship with G-d and each other, so this is a time to reflect on our relationship with the natural world and our role as its living, breathing, and *consuming* custodians. Has there ever been a more urgent time to do just that?

Here at Kol Ami, we have long taken this responsibility to heart. The dedicated volunteers of our Sustainability Committee have led us through many years of Tu B'Shvat seders – including one now being planned for the evening of January 19th (virtually, once again).

In 2007 we launched the region's first Jewish CSA (Community Supported Agriculture), created in concert with Hazon (the "Jewish Lab for Sustainability") and a model for other Jewish CSAs locally and nationally. Ten years later, in 2017, we again partnered with Hazon to receive the Hazon Seal of Sustainability. The seal certifies that a Jewish organization has committed to meet a set of criteria making it a good world citizen regarding its food and environmental practices, treatment of animals, and impact on climate change.

And in just this last year, we joined the Brit Hazon initiative – with an increasing number of households in our congregation signing on to a commitment ("brit" or covenant) to take simple individual actions that together add up to a positive impact on our environment. I encourage everyone to take the opportunity of Tu B'Shvat to check out Brit Hazon (https://hazon.org/commit-to-change/brithazon) for inspiration, education, and guided steps to making a difference.

January, of course, also marks our passage into 2022 – perhaps surprisingly with more pandemic uncertainty than we had hoped for. Yet to our great delight we have successfully restarted regular in-person services, religious school, and choir practice in our new synagogue home. And our physical Kol Ami identity in this new space is continuing to take shape:

In January we expect that construction will start on the renovation of offices for our Rabbi and Executive Director in the administrative wing of the Beth Sholom campus.

Additional upgrades will allow for installation of our Yahrzeit memorial cabinet in the Bornstein room where our Friday night Shabbat services are now held, and our donor board in the adjacent hallway looking out onto the atrium.

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Welcome Congregant Jackee Swartz

Kol Ami gives a warm, hearty welcome to new member Jackee Swartz, who joined during the summer. She learned about our congregation after getting to know our Rabbi's mother Amy Berkowitz when they took part in a bereavement group. (Jackee's husband passed away in 2019, and she recently commemorated his yahrzeit). Jackee says that Amy invited her to attend a Kol Ami service via Zoom and the experience made her feel that she would fit in well with our congregation.

Years ago Jackee was very active (and a board member) at Bustleton Somerton Synagogue, a small and close-knit congregation where her family felt "right at home." Life circumstances made it difficult for Jackee to continue her membership there, but now she has chosen to become part of our family at Kol Ami, and we intend to help her feel right at home here as well.

Jackee was born and raised in Philadelphia. She and her husband moved to New Brunswick, NJ while he completed his doctoral fellowship at Rutgers. Later, they returned to Philadelphia. Looking further back in time, Jackee's mother and father emigrated from Russia. Jackee's grandfather was an Orthodox Rabbi who presided over the first synagogue in Strawberry Mansion, and he was mentioned in the *Who's Who in the Philadelphia Rabbinate* from the early 1900's. He passed away prior to Jackee's birth, so regrettably she never met him, but she is named after him. Jackee notes that she visited her grandfather's synagogue building in Strawberry Mansion with her cousins, and found that it still had Hebrew writing on the facade.

In her career, Jackee was a Principal of an inner city school in Philadelphia. She was also very active at College Settlement Camp and was able to provide several of her Feltonville Horn School students with an opportunity to attend a two -week overnight experience at the camp. In return, she became active on the Board of Directors at the camp, which is geared towards families with very limited income. Generally speaking, Jackee identifies as someone who is very interested and involved in positive social action.

Jackee has two sons, one of whom lives with his family in New York. Her other son had been a "lone soldier" serving in the IDF, then he married a Sabra, and they are currently raising their three children in Israel. One of Jackee's grandsons is living in a Yeshiva in Israel, and they share a wonderful family ritual of talking every Friday morning to discuss the Torah portion for the week. She states that they examine how the words of the Torah relate to our life in today's world. Jackee's Israeli granddaughter will turn 12 years old in November and Jackee is hoping to share her Bat Mitzvah experience. Toward that goal, Jackee has been studying Hebrew and Torah with Na'Amat for the past year to become a Bat Mitzvah herself in December. Jackee emphasizes that she is naturally very interested in any issues regarding Israel, and that anything that affects her three Israeli grandchildren affects her deeply.

Jackee loves to travel, and hopefully she will be able to do more of that safely and happily as time passes, especially to see her grandchildren in Israel. Jackee states that she is glad to be part of the Kol Ami family, and we are equally happy to welcome her into our community.



We are in a global environmental crisis and Jewish tradition compels us to respond.

A growing community of people in our congregation is creating a more sustainable and equitable world for all through **Brit Hazon**, a simple six-week commitment program that mobilizes individuals to take action and make real change. After choosing their commitment, participants receive a tip sheet and a series of six weekly emails designed to provide the information, inspiration, and tools they need to be successful. After completing their six-week Brit Hazon commitment, participants are encouraged to stick to their new behavior and to sign up for a new commitment.

Reports from some of the Congregation Kol Ami Community Brit Group participants

Brit: Reduce Household Waste

"Learning about plastics pollution definitely heightened my awareness of the huge amount of plastic containers in grocery and other stores. The result is a much greater effort on my part to bypass products in containers that are plastic-based, to always bring a canvas bag with me to grocery stores to avoid plastic bag use. I've also become more aware of food waste resulting in more disciplined shopping, using leftovers" - Karen Gurmankin

Brit: Reduce Food Waste

"The campaign really heightened my awareness of how much food waste I can create. We are doing a better job of using all of the veggies, and a much better job of saving scraps for soup stock and for the compost pile. These have been easy new habits to create that can make a real difference, and that have me feeling better too about what I can do at home." - Jeff Cohen

"I've initiated a campaign with my friends and neighbors in my multiunit condo building to buy into a food waste collection service. The goal is to cut down on the amount of organic material we send from the building to the landfill (methane emissions from landfills are a leading cause of climate change), get back a little compost for household plants and balcony container gardens, and enrich the soil of urban farm partners. If we can decrease the cost of trash collection for the condo building, everybody wins!" - Mark Kaplan

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Brit: Transition to a Plant-Rich Diet

"I may have increased my plant-based meals a bit, but more importantly, I felt additional encouragement and support. Transitioning to "plant-rich diet" does make a difference in terms of the environmental impact and the way I feel. I appreciated the information and additional resources shared each week during the campaign. I used some tips at work!" - Shelley Chamberlain

Brit: Buy Less Stuff

"I love shopping but decided to to buy less, shop in consignment stores, and trade clothes with friends and family, rather than buying more new stuff that I just don't need." - Ronit Sugar
