The Highest Level of Tzedaka

I don't usually share the ins and outs of my discretionary fund with the congregation (If I did, it wouldn't be very discreet!). However, I recently received a beautiful thank you letter for one special disbursement, and I felt that the whole congregation would take pride in what we were able to provide for this refugee family in our community.

Maimonides tells us that the highest level of *tzedaka* is to offer a gift, a loan, employment, or a business partnership to the person in need, so that they will no longer need assistance (Mishneh Torah, Laws of Tzedaka 10:7). Your generous donations are making it possible for us to perform this highest level of tzedaka as a congregation.

Additionally, I wanted to share that this gift was made possible through a generous gift that was made years ago in memory of our beloved member Jensen Toth. Her memory continues to be a blessing.

I also want to acknowledge that Kol Ami members Shelley Chamberlain and Roz Holtzman are taking part in a Welcome Circle for two other Ukrainian refugees, and we are grateful and proud for all the incredible work they have been doing as well.

		We were delighted and surprised when a check arrived in the mail to as- sist the C family. This was a life-changing gift to Yevhen, Yuliia and Nikol, who are refugees from the war in Ukraine. They have very limited English but they ok'd me writing to you on their behalf.
	abbat service and rah dialogue	The C family was in a difficult spot. They had come to Elkins Park in need of emergency housing. Their plan was to share a one-bedroom apartment with their friends (who were themselves a family of three) until they could find emergency housing (which was us).
Sat Au	urday, July 8, 22 and gust 5 at 10:00 a.m.— om only	We got to know them, and we learned that their savings just wasn't going to cover the first month's rent, last month's rent and a security deposit required in the Philly suburbs. They used almost all their resources to get to Poland, live for a year, and then to travel to the US. We all did the math and realized that without major help, it would be a long time until they could afford a place on their own.
	HIGH HOLY DAYS Ditember 9— <i>Selichot</i>	Through all of this, we saw a path to this family being okay. Yevhen had been a truck driver in Ukraine, and he wanted to get a Commercial Driv- er's License (CDL) to earn a living here. He happened to be in Poland on a work assignment when the invasion began. They decided to use the funds from Kol Ami to enroll in a local trucking school. Now, he has a pathway to earning a good living for his family at a real job with benefits.

While students and teachers take a break to reset during the summer months, my summer is spent planning and creating programming that fits our Religious School community's ever-changing needs.

To aid me in this process, some Religious School families will receive surveys over the next several weeks to help me determine what these needs are.

Once again, registration for the coming year will be automatic for current students. While your students' minds may be far from Religious School by now, there are a few upcoming opportunities to keep in mind. I am excited to propose our participation in the **Jewish Youth Climate Movement!** This year, we hope to create our own *kevutzah* (chapter) of the Jewish Youth Climate Movement, a teen-led organization under the umbrella of Adamah that allows youth to address the climate crisis through a Jewish lens. Students will participate in education, long-term projects, and community events with the support of a national network. While meeting times will mostly coincide with our regular programming for students in grades seven through ten, all Jewish students between grades seven and twelve are invited to join- regardless of their participation in our other programs! To get this group off the ground, we need students who are willing to lead our chapter (with support!). Please contact me if you are interested.

We will also once again participate in the **L'Taken Social Justice Seminar**. We are excited to offer another opportunity for high school students to travel to Washington, DC, learn about the relationship between social justice and Jewish values, and lobby members of Congress about issues important to them. We are also proud to offer a revitalized program for our students in grades seven through ten that includes outings, monthly dinners, interfaith programming, and social justice work. As always, student input has been crucial to building the curriculum for next year's program, and it will reflect their unique interests. Look out for an upcoming survey to decide the best weekday meeting time for this program.

Congregation Kol Ami members enjoyed a tour of the Rosenbach Museum and Library on Delancey Street in Philadelphia on May 18. On the house tour led by the congregation's president, Gary Turetsky, the visitors got to view the art and rare book treasures in the collection, including the original Thomas Sully portrait of Rebecca Gratz and the first edition of the poems of Phyllis Wheatley, a volume printed in London in 1773 which is the first book ever published by an African-American writer. Our members also got to examine, with the expert guidance of the museum's curator, Judy Guston, several examples of rare Judaica, including the first Hebrew Bible, printed with commentary, in 1482 in Bologna, Italy, and the first Hebrew Bible printed in Lisbon, Portugal in 1491.
