# How to Be Good Machetonim (In-Laws) and Grandparents in Interfaith Families—A Capstone Project

As many of you know, I am currently part of the Rukin Rabbinical Fellowship through 18Doors (formerly Interfaith Family). In recent weeks, as I've considered what I want to work on for my capstone project, I've discovered some interesting things about how we look at interfaith families.

Previously, when I thought about interfaith work, I thought mostly about couples who were getting married, raising children together, navigating the various holidays and life cycle events, and sometimes, dealing with their in-laws. Or I was thinking about the experiences of children in growing up in a multifaith or multicultural household, and what support they needed to feel fully welcome in the Jewish community.

But when I thought back to recent conversations in our Interfaith Relationship Dialogue Group, I realized that parents of adult children are often a neglected piece of the interfaith puzzle. What has been coming up most often in our own community is how we might best support adult children as they marry and build their own families, often in an interfaith context.

### Rabbi's Message (continued)

Parents of adult children, even while fully supporting interfaith marriages (or even being intermarried themselves), might still find themselves with questions or concerns about how to be good *machetonim* (in-laws). How do we navigate holidays, life-cycles, and other traditions with these new additions to our family, especially when our backgrounds are different?

For those who are blessed with grandchildren, I find that there are some competing impulses that are worth exploring. There is a desire to joyously share the most beloved and important parts of ourselves and our heritage with these magnificent new human beings. There is a sense of obligation to one's ancestors not to break the chain, and to pass one's traditions on to another generation. But there is also a need to make space for one's children and their partners to make their own choices and start their own traditions, which often involves keeping one's mouth shut except to say, "That's great, honey! How can I help?"

As I start to develop a capstone project for my fellowship, I'm looking for more ways we can support parents of adult children in interfaith marriages and grandparents of children in interfaith families. This would include parents of adult children who are part of interfaith marriages, and those whose grandchildren are being raised in interfaith households.

I'm looking to interview a few of our members about their experience welcoming their adult children's partners into the family and being a supportive in-law and/or grandparent. I've heard from several of you about the joys and challenges you face, and I'd love to hear from more of you about what resources might be useful. ### **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS**

At Congregation Kol Ami, our sense of community is what sets us apart from other synagogues. Our students all get to know each other over the course of the year, and students support each other, no matter their grade.

We strive to include our Religious School families in this strong community. Our last two months were full of opportunities to do this. Parents of students in each class got to know each other better at three Family Programs, and we all celebrated Shabbat together at our second Religious School erev Shabbat Service, where students shared the creative and dynamic projects that have encouraged them to think deeply about Jewish values.

Additionally, our high school students worked closely with each other to learn more about the relationship between Judaism and social justice, before lobbying Congress at the L'Taken Social Justice Seminar in Washington, DC. This experience included a trip to the National Holocaust Museum, where students reflected on this immense tragedy and how it still impacts us today.

I had the incredible opportunity to travel to Israel with the Venture Israel Fellowship, a joint effort between the Jewish Learning Venture and the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia. The purpose of the trip and fellowship is to enrich Israel Education in our region, and I am excited to revitalize Israel education in our community to reflect the diversity, complexity, and culture of Israel. Please be on the lookout for Israel programming soon.

The coming months are active in the Jewish community, with both Purim and Passover ahead. At Religious School, we will prepare for Purim with our own Purim program on Sunday, March 10. Be sure to wear your costumes! We will combine students from multiple classes through trivia games, art, and practicing the Purim tradition of exchanging gifts of food.

Soon after, we will prepare for Passover with our Chocolate Seder on April 21. This was our most popular event last year, and I'm excited to bring it back. This Seder is a fun educational tool to teach students about the Seder structure.








### **KOL AMI'S 2024 CLIMATE ACTION PLAN IS SUBMITTED**

Since its inception in fall, 2022, the Jewish Climate Leadership Coalition (JCLC)\* has grown exponentially to <u>280 member organizations</u>, including Congregation Kol Ami, working to decarbonize American Jewish institutions and multiply our impact across Jewish communal life. All members annually submit their Climate Action Plans before Tu B'Shvat.

We are thrilled to report that the first batch of Climate Action Plan submissions from Coalition members are in, and the preliminary results indicate that, together, our collective actions in the Jewish community have been inspiring and impactful. Here is some of what has been learned so far:



We are proud to share a summary of our own Kol Ami strategy, which reflects on our successes and challenges in achieving our climate priorities, and articulates goals for the year ahead and beyond: —

### KOL AMI'S 2024 CLIMATE ACTION PLAN IS SUBMITTED (continued)

Since we currently do not own our building and have limited environmental impact there, our core work on environmental sustainability and justice is in educational activities and advocacy, through our Shomrei Adamah environmental stewardship committee. This standing committee, since 2013, under the umbrella of social action, has enjoyed continuous support and buy-in from the congregational leadership and membership. We were awarded the Hazon Seal of Sustainability every year since its inception in 2017-2022. Our ongoing annual Tu B'Shvat Seder, Earth Day Shabbat, Sukkot in the Fields, CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) distribution, and regular community volunteer activities in urban farming, food relief and a local park native-plant restoration, have become part of our congregational traditions, culture, and identity.

In 2022, Past President Ben Adams presented a virtual talk on understanding home energy. Our Rabbi led a four-week session on Jewish Wisdom and Environmental Justice in the fall 2023 for congregants. Included in this series was a talk by a guest speaker on Food Landscaping with a Jewish Lens, encouraging members to plant and grow more fruits and vegetables at our homes.

We will continue these ongoing activities in the coming year and plan additional educational and advocacy activities that develop from our Jewish environmental organizational re sources. We coordinate these activities and liaison with our Religious School Director, who is working towards establishing a <u>Jewish Youth Climate Movement Kvutzah</u> (chapter/group) on site. We will continue to encourage our members to do what they can in their own homes and lives, eg. energy efficiency and decarbonization, reducing waste and compost ing, buying through CSA, home gardening, bee keeping, backyard chickens, sustainable landscaping, and sharing excess food.

\*In the fall of 2022, Adamah (formerly Hazon), along with nineteen other major national and international umbrella Jewish organizations, collectively launched the Jewish Climate Leadership Coalition (JCLC). The coalition supplanted the Hazon Seal of Sustainability program, of which Congregation Kol Ami was among the first participants. The JCLC focuses on supporting institutions getting to zero carbon emissions and expanding in our communities and beyond on climate action. Jewish organizations everywhere are invited to join the Coalition. There is no cost to membership. Coalition members pledge to develop, implement, evaluate, and share a yearly climate action plan, using Adamah's resources and support, reflecting our unique needs and capacity. **Carol Wit**, artist and Kol Ami Congregant, started creating at a very young age using stamps and lipstick on walls to her parent's chagrin. By junior high school she channeled her love of drawing using pen and ink, and later, while pursuing a professional education, discovered printmaking as the perfect art method. She received a Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A.) from San Francisco Art Institute in San Francisco, CA and M.Ed in Expressive Therapy (Art Therapy) from Lesley College in Cambridge, MA. For over forty years her artwork has been shown in numerous galleries, private collections and juried shows located in PA, NJ, MD, FL, MA, and CA. Carol is a member of the Cheltenham Printmaking Guild and the American Color Print Society. Carol's imagery evokes emotions and thought through a spectrum of colors, the interplay of line, shape, texture, and space. Her one-of-a-kind prints (Monotypes) and Etchings range from abstract to expressionistic realism.

**Natalie Dyen** took a somewhat circuitous route to the world of photography. To avoid being photographed, she *stepped* behind the camera and remained there for many years. Her father was a superb painter, but unfortunately, she inherited none of his artistic skills. Photography gave her the opportunity to become an artist because it didn't require her to make sketches, mix colors, or draw straight lines. All she had to do was keep her eyes open, knowing that wherever she looked there was an extraordinary picture hidden somewhere, waiting to be discovered. Her task as a photographer was to find it.
